Britt went the distance, he pitched a two-hit shutout, his third shutout of the year. Britt struck out 15 Stanfield batters and walked only one. The Mustangs gave Britt the only run he would need in the top of the first inning when Doug Devin walked and was hit in by Slater

Mitchell.

The Mustangs added three more runs in the third inning, one more in the sixth, and two in the seventh to give the Mustangs a 7 to 0 victory. Brandon Pedro had three hits for the Mustangs, and Tom Kenny, Slater Mitchell and the Britt brothers had two hits each.

In the nightcap the Mustangs had Jim Kindle on the mound, Kindle pitched 4-1/3 innings, giving up four runs and striking out 10 batters. Scott Coe came in and struck out six batters to pick up his second save of the year.

The Mustangs gave their pitchers all the support they needed in the top of the first inning when they erupted for seven runs. The Mustangs scored only two more runs the rest of the game but held on to get the win 9 to 4. The Mustangs are now eight and two in league play and are second place in the CBC standings.
