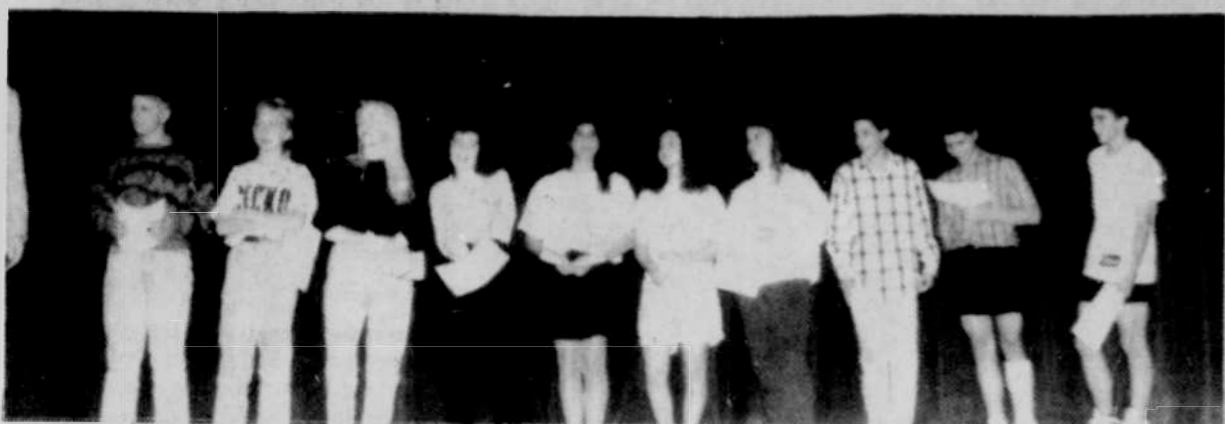


Heppner students receive many awards at Academic Assembly

Now is time to control weeds

Controlling noxious weeds often times gets shoved to the bottom of the list of things to do during the spring. With spring almost over, noxious weeds will be bolting and producing seed soon. Morrow County ordinance mandates that noxious weeds be controlled to prevent the production and spread of viable seed.

Weeds classified as noxious ('A' list) within Morrow County are Rush skeletonweed, yellow starthistle, Tansy ragwort, dalmatian and yellow toadflax, Mediterranean sage, leafy spurge, spikeweed, musk and Scotch thistle.

Weeds of economic importance

('B' list), although not mandated, should also receive attention at this time. They include poison hemlock, Canada thistle, jointed goatgrass, St. Johnswort, perennial sowthistle, field bindweed, cereal rye, wild oats, Johnsongrass, knapweed (Russian, diffuse and spotted), field dodder, western waterhemlock, Medusahead rye, puncturevine, purple loosestrife, whitetop and Kochia.
