

# Students earn R & W treats through reading

A record number of certificates for treats at the R & W Drive-In were earned by students in grades one through seven, through the R & W Reading Program at Heppner Elementary School.

This was the fifth year of the program started by drive-in owners Tom and Helen Riehl as a means to encourage children to read more. Each reading teacher established criteria appropriate for the age and reading ability of the child. For each goal reached, the student was given a certificate good for a specific treat at the R & W either ice cream cones, sundaes, shakes or an R & W "Delight."

This past year 167 different students earned a total of 418 certificates. Last year the Riehls donated 376 certificates to 187 different students. Teachers report that the program encourages students to read and that many have not only improved their reading, but seem to be developing in their enjoyment of reading, said Heppner Elementary School reading specialist, Linda Shaw.

In the 1989-90 school year 167 students earned 418 certificates; in 1988-89 187 students earned 376; in 1987-88 153 earned 334; and in 1986-87 105 earned 190.

## Neighborhood center hub of activities

The Neighborhood Center will sponsor a frozen potato giveaway June 13 from 1 to 3 p.m. Simplot donates the potatoes to the center. The potatoes are given to anyone on a donation basis and monies received go into the center's donation fund.

There will be a class on drying fruits and vegetables June 28 from 7 to 9:30 p.m. at the center. The Extension office will present the class. There is no charge but those interested should call the center if they plan to attend. There is a nine-tray food dryer at the center for public use. A small donation will be requested to help cover the cost of the electricity used. A pressure canner is also available to loan.

Twenty-seven volunteers donated time during the three days of the rummage sale. With the addition of the regular volunteers, 507 hours of volunteer work was donated for the month of May. Miller's Mini Mart & Chevron and the Soroptimist Club gave monetary donations. Donated food from private persons and businesses totaled 218 1/2 lbs. Since the sale, the rummage table and sale of donated furniture has added \$237.25 to the donation fund.

During the month of May, nine emergency food boxes were given, serving 23 persons, according to center secretary VoJean Forquer. Eleven people received clothing and one person received pharmaceutical assistance. Two families received household furniture. A case of cereal

was given to the Day Care Center. Another wheelchair has been donated to the center, says Forquer. The center now has two wheelchairs, a walker, several pairs of crutches, braces and other things available at no cost to anyone needing them temporarily.

The Soroptimist Club has donated 50 day-pass swimming tickets for low income children. City hall is printing the tickets and the center will disperse them to qualified children.

Adult and Family Services sends a representative from the Hermiston office to the center the first and third Wednesday of each month. Call the center for information and phone number.

Donated clothing and articles that are new or like new are given with the Christmas food boxes. Throughout the year they are wrapped, labeled and stored in the "Christmas room." "If you have extra Christmas wrap it will be gratefully accepted and put to good use," said Forquer.

"We have been delightfully surprised at the success of the rummage table selection," she said. "It has generated a lot of interest and has proven to be a good source of income. Drop in and check it out. You may find that needed article or a treasure you can't live without."
