**Independence**

With the Fourth of July soon upon us, we should reflect on the occasion. I remember the day called "Independence Day." It was, of course, the day the Declaration of Independence was ratified. Actually, the date was really July 2, 1776, but traditionally we celebrate July 4. The preciseness of historic detail is beyond us in this article.

My history teacher reminded me that the move in the Colonies toward independence grew out of the failure of the mother country to allow the Colonies representation in Parliament. Great Britain imposed heavy taxes on the Colonies. After all, that's what colonies are for, to feed the governmental coffers back home. It's been that way since civilization began.

The phrase "taxation without representation" really did cover much of the drive toward independence. But there were many regulations too, that the Colonies had no voice in drafting.

In that historical context, next week we will celebrate the day independence was declared. Independence carries with it the freedom to exercise that independence. The new constitution did not survive long without a bill of rights that embodied that freedom.

In many and varied forms, the freedom our independence-seeking forefathers crafted is being exercised by all of us today. And that, indeed, is cause to celebrate.

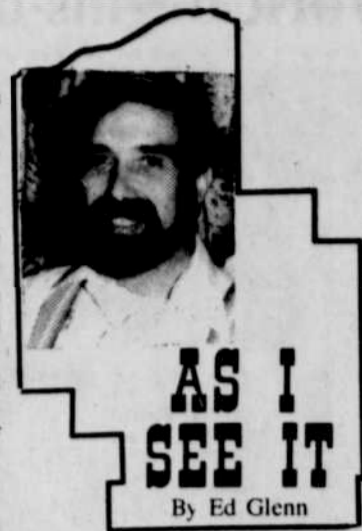
These very words are brought to you compliments of the freedom of the press to print the truth, even if it might be embarrassing to some governmental official, or detrimental to the state.

Each of us is free to attend the panel discussion on water issues Thursday night and voice his opinion, even if it may be contrary to that held by the government or some other person. That, too, is cause to celebrate.

It simply must be true that we are free to worship as we choose, just count the number of different churches in town. We do not have police searching through our dresser drawers without cause nor are we arrested on mere suspicion of crime.

We are free to pursue an occupation of our choice, move to a different city, marry our own love and raise our children in the city or the country. The American market place is the broadest in scope of any in the world, offering a selection of goods and services unknown outside our own country. All of these things are cause to celebrate in the most joyous way. You will read severe criticism of our system, government, state of affairs in general in this column. But make no mistake, I believe this country is the greatest one the world has ever known and next week is the annual occasion for all truly patriot Americans to stand up and be counted.
