Jodi Vandeventer

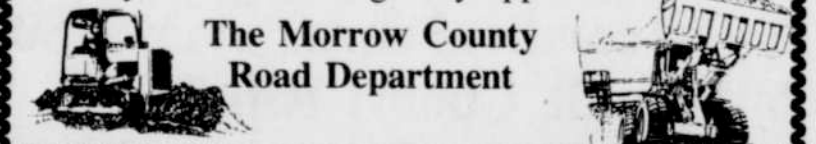
