William Adon Hamlett

Funeral services for William Adon Hamlett, 76, were held Oct. 31, 1990, at the Lone United Church of Christ.

Mr. Hamlett was born Sept. 29, 1914, at Sunnyvale, CA, and died Oct. 25, 1990, at Portland. He grew up in the Palo Alto and San Jose, CA, areas, and married Eva Swanson on Nov. 19, 1948, in California. He moved to Lone in 1949. Mr. Hamlett was a longtime Mason and loved music, enjoying jazz and singing. He was a member of the Heppner Elks Club and the United Church of Christ in Lone. He worked as a hospital aide for the state of Oregon.

Mr. Hamlett is survived by a daughter, Sharlene Arends, Benton City, WA; and two sons, Richard and Thomas, both of Portland. His wife, Eva, preceded him in death. Donations in his name may be made to the Bank of Eastern Oregon.

Richard O'Shea

Dr. Richard O'Shea of Lake Oswego, a family physician, died Sept. 14 at his home. He was 68.

Born April 20, 1922, in Ellensburg, WA., O'Shea attended Oregon State University in 1940 and graduated from University of Oregon Medical School in 1947. He served an internship at St. Vincent Hospital in San Diego County Hospital.

Heppner was his first medical practice, beginning in 1949 and continuing until he was called up for service in the Korean War. He served in the Medical Corps of the U.S. Army for five years. He then returned to the medical profession in Lake Oswego in 1954, opening a family practice which he continued until his retirement in 1982.

His involvement in the community included serving as doctor of the high school sports teams, and providing physicals and inoculations to students in the public schools, the Lake Oswego police and fire departments and the FBI. He was a member of the local school board from 1962 to 1966.

His professional associations in-

cluded Sigma Phi Epsilon at Oregon State University, the Oregon Association of Family Practice, the Physician's Institute and the Physicians Association of Clackamas County. He served as president of the Oregon Association of Family Practice in 1969.

Survivors include his wife, Clare; six children, Launee St. Clair and Timothy O'Shea of Beaverton, Kathy Lundgren of Albany, Patrick O'Shea of Coburg, Richard O'Shea of Seattle, Wash. and Shannon Jaqua of Hillsboro; two brothers, Dale Dennis of Stafford and Dallas Dennis of Lake Oswego; two sisters, Illyne Schmidt of Eugene and Sally Miller of Carlsbad, CA.; and eight grandchildren.

Mass of Christian Burial was said Sept. 19 at the Church of the Resurrection at Marylhurst College. Interment was at Willamette National Cemetery. Memorial contributions may be made to the Alzheimer's Disease Association.

She was musician for all of the organizations she belonged to and also played for many weddings, graduations and funerals. Mustangs claim CBC crown in upset with Umatilla Vikings

The Heppner Mustangs won the Columbia Basin Conference championship Friday with a convincing 33-0 shutout over the Umatilla Vikings in Umatilla. The Vikings, the fourth rated 2A team in the state fell easily as the Mustangs played error-free football while forcing the Vikings into a total of eight turnovers.

Another quick start by Heppner got the Mustangs out right. Cory Grabeel recovered the first of six Umatilla fumbles and the Mustangs started from their own 40-yard line. A 15-yard run by Rick Osmin and a 17-yard completion from Bob Krein to Doug Devin, along with a halfback pass from Osmin to Jason Britt moved them inside the 10-yard line. A fumble, the only Mustang miscue for the day, gave the Vikings the ball.

Umatilla quarterback Rusty Green fumbled on the first play and Jason Britt picked it up and waltzed into the end zone for the first Mustang score. Osmin added the pat for a 7-0 lead.

Heppner scored on an eight play 53-yard drive finished off by a Bob Krein sneak from two yards out. Big plays on the drive were a 21-yard halfback pass from Osmin to Brandon Pedro and an 18-yard gain by Krein on an option keeper.

Going for the throat, coach Grant called an inside kick and Britt was on the bottom of the pile for Heppner. Two plays into the second quarter, Krein hit Pedro with a 35-yard scoring toss. The pat was wide and the Mustangs led 20-0 and Umatilla had run only five plays.

The Vikings had two drives in the

second quarter. One was ended by a Bob Krein interception and the defense held on the other one. The defensive line was outstanding in the early going with Bubba Burt, Kevin Bond and Jim Kindle in the middle, shutting down the running game, aided by Britt and Osmin at linebacker. Grabeel, Jacob Maben and Ryan Currin at defensive end corralled the outside game and the Mustang secondary was awesome. Jay Michael had his strongest game of the season and Krein, Devin and Pedro each had an interception.

Heppner put the game away on the first possession of the second half. Osmin returned the kickoff 49 yards to the Umatilla 37-yard line and it took only four plays for the Mustangs to score. Cory Grabeel squirted through the line for a six-yard touchdown. The try for two failed and it was 26-0. You could almost hear Don Meredith singing turn out the lights.

Umatilla ran only eight plays in the third quarter and Devin intercepted a green pass to end a drive early in the fourth quarter.

Bob Krein sprinted past the Viking secondary for a 28-yard touchdown run with 5:48 left in the

game. Osmin added the pat and made the final score 33-0.

It was apparent that the coaching staff of Greg Grant, Les Payne and Dave Presley devised an excellent game plan and got the best effort of the year out of many of the players.

The victory, Heppner's third in a row over the Vikings, capped an undefeated league season and a championship for the Mustangs. The loss was the first of the year for Umatilla. They must travel to Vale to face the number 1 rated 2A team in the state.

The Mustangs will host the second place team from the Wapiti League, the Grant Union Prospectors. The game will be played Friday night, November 9, at 7:30 p.m. at the Morrow County Fairgrounds. This is the first round of the OSAA State Football playoffs.

INSULATE WATER METERS NOW

This year the water meters will be read during the winter months, but the meters will need to be insulated. Please put the insulation material (foam pellets, rags, newspaper, etc.) in a small plastic garbage bag that can be easily removed or pushed aside. Be sure that the bag is securely tied or sealed.

If you have had frozen pipes in the past, it is advisable to let a faucet run at a fast drip during extremely cold weather. Any damages resulting from frozen water meters that have NOT been insulated will be repaired at the owner's expense.
