Irish born priest new at catholic church

"People are much the same everywhere," says Father Gerry Condon, new priest at St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Heppner. And he should know. Condon, who was born and raised in Ireland, has served the people in nine parishes in Eastern Oregon.

Father Condon was born in 1927 in Dublin to James and Anne Con-

don. In 1955 he graduated from St. Patrick's Seminary in Thurles County Tipperary, where he was ordained. After graduation Father Condon wrote to several dioceses interested in obtaining priests and the first response he received was from the bishop of the Baker Diocese which includes Eastern Oregon. His first assignment was in 1955 to Lakeview in southern Oregon. Father Condon said that Lakeview is also "very Irish" and that he found it very easy to settle in the U.S. The arid Eastern Oregon climate, however, he said, is "vastly different," from Ireland, which is damp and mild, much like that of Vancouver, B.C.

After his assignment in Lakeview, Father Condon worked in parishes in Nyssa, Redmond, Wasco, Condon, Merrill, which is near Klamath Falls, Ontario and Prineville before coming to Heppner. He had been to Heppner before, in 1958, when he spent several months assisting in St. Patrick's Parish. The past year Father Condon spent working as a priest in a suburban parish in Ireland.

Jodi Hall, granddaughter of Gene and Harriet Hall of Heppner, was named as the Pennsylvania FFA North Central Star in Agribusiness as part of the State FFA Degree ceremonies at the annual FFA mid-winter convention. The activity was held in conjunction with the Pennsylvania Farm Show in Harrisburg, PA. The Farm Show is billed as the largest indoor free agricultural exposition in the United States. Hall was one of four individuals from across the state to be singled out within their respective geographic regions. Her supervised agricultural experiences included poinsettias, spring bedding plants, and a variety of placement positions mainly in landscaping and nursery production settings. Jodi is a senior at State College Area High School.

Hall's FFA accomplishments are many and varied. She has been a state finalist in public speaking contests each of her three years, winning second in the extemporaneous contest last year. She had won the State Sales and Service Proficiency Award as well as the State Record Book Contest. Jodi was the winner of the Pennsylvania scholarship to attend the Washington Leadership Conference in 1989. She and her sister, Linda, represented Pennsylvania in the talent review at the national FFA convention in Kansas City last year with a country western song and dance performance.

Jodi is the current president of her local FFA chapter. She is very active in 4-H, Key Club, yearbook, student advisory council, and was the local and state representative in the Hugh O'Brian Youth program. Jodi was a 1990 finalist in the Centre County Young Woman of the Year program where she won the community service and physical fitness competitions. She also has

earned varsity letters in both basketball and track.

Jodi is the daughter of David and Nancy Hall of State College. She has been accepted to attend Pennsylvania State University next fall where she will dual major in agricultural education and production horticulture with a minor in international agriculture. She will be a candidate for a state FFA office at the annual Pennsylvania FFA activities week in June.
