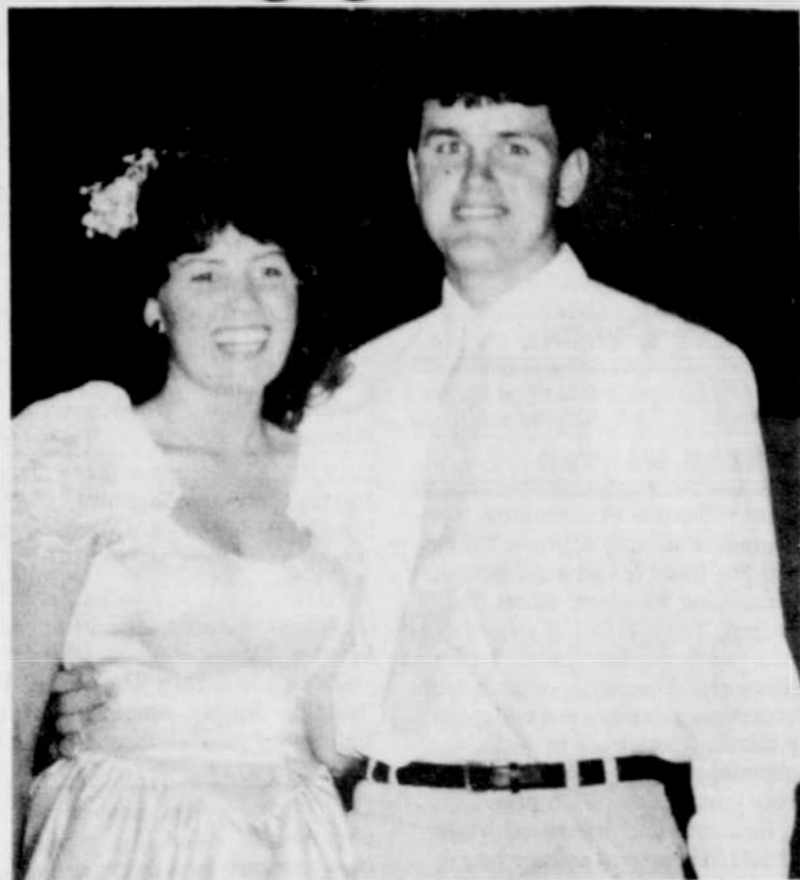


## Engagements

## Mustangs stay on top of CBC; take win over Tiger-Scots, 80-77

The Heppner Mustangs took a big step to stay at the top of the CBC with an 80-77 win on the road against the Weston-McEwen Tiger-Scots.

Heppner came out flat against a determined charge from the Tiger-Scots and trailed, 20-12, after the first quarter. Seven players scored for the young Tiger-Scots and Heppner's pressure defense wasn't stopping them.

The Mustangs exploded for 36 points in the second stanza, an unbelievable total for one eight minute period. The big gun for Heppner was senior Rick Osmin. He scored 15 points in the quarter with a single three-pointer to go with four other field goals and 4-5 from the foul line. The half ended with the Mustangs leading, 48-39, and

Weston-McEwen was still scoring a lot of points against the Mustangs.

The Tiger-Scots got even closer outscoring Heppner 26-20, in the third period. Brian Pickard had 14 of his game-high 23 points in the period and Heppner led, 68-65 heading down the stretch.

With 5 1/2 minutes left, the Mustangs switched to a half court trap as the Tiger-Scots were scoring inside and beating the Mustangs full court pressure down the court for easy baskets.

Inside one minute Heppner went to a delay offense and, despite missing two one-and-one opportunities down to the wire, got out of town with a big road win.

Osmin led the Mustangs with 19 points. Freshman Rick Koffler added 16 off the bench. Brandon Pedro

and Bob Krein each had 12 counters and Jason Britt chipped in with 10 points in a well-balanced scoring attack for Heppner.

Pickard, a 6'3" junior led Weston-McEwen with 23 points. Keith Walters had 13, Todd Rainwater 11 and Adam Bailey 10 in a losing cause.

Britt and Osmin each had nine boards against the taller Tiger-Scots.
