

Fillies lose to Weston-McEwen earn second place trophy at District

The Fillies lost to Weston-McEwen, 24-73 in the Fillies' second game of the district tournament held Saturday, Feb. 23 at Pendleton.

The Tiger-Scots outscored the Fillies from the start. It wasn't that the Fillies didn't shoot—they matched Weston-McEwen in field goal attempts—but their shots just wouldn't sink. Several times the ball hit the rim and rolled around before popping out. At halftime the Tiger Scots led by 18 points.

In the second half Weston-McEwen's Joy Glidewell (recipient of the district tournament MVP award) just kept sinking her shots and blocking the Fillies to lead her team to an even higher score. With five minutes left in the final quarter, both teams put their second string in. Neither team sunk very many baskets but the Fillies bench never gave up.

The final score was Heppner 24, Weston-McEwen 73. Nikki Brisbois led her team with six points. Amy Greenup, Heather Eckman and Kim Johnston all rallied for four points.

The Fillies will play Imbler Friday, March 1 in the opening rounds of the Regional Tournament. Game time is 1:30 p.m. at Eastern Oregon State College Quinn Coliseum, loser-out.

Two accident victims doing well

Two Heppner men injured in a one-vehicle accident on Friday, Feb. 22, are doing well and are expected to be released from the hospital within the next several days, according to a nursing supervisor at Good Shepherd Community Hospital in Hermiston.

Donnie W. Bell and Eugene Robert Harris, both 22, were transported to Good Shepherd Hospital following an accident involving a 1987 two-door Chevrolet sedan at 10:35 p.m. at mile post 15 on Highway 207.

At presstime, Bell, who had been hospitalized with contusions and abrasions, was in stable condition. Harris, hospitalized with contusions, abrasions and lacerations was expected to be transferred out of intensive care Feb. 26, said the Good Shepherd Hospital supervisor.

The Lexington EMTs, the Ione Fire Department and the Heppner ambulance responded to the accident.

The accident is under the investigation of the Morrow County Sheriff's department.

Town clean up March 5, 9

The first phase of a community-wide clean-up campaign will get underway next week.

The clean up, in preparation for the St. Patrick's festivities and the first goal of the Vision 2000 economic development committee, will start Tuesday, March 5, with a Main Street cleanup by Main Street merchants from 6 to 8 p.m. Peggy Fishburn, who is in charge of downtown cleanup, is asking merchants to "sweep walks, pull weeds, paint, plant flowers, or whatever to make Main Street more attractive." Streets will be swept prior to downtown clean up says Ann Spicer, Vision 2000 chairman.

Spicer said merchants are asked to clean up the immediate area around their business, including sidewalks and business fronts.

Fishburn says that those needing assistance on big projects may contact her for a crew to help.

Two other areas in addition to Main St. are being targeted for

cleanup on March 9, according to Spicer--the north entrance to town and Willow Creek.

Fred Lundin is in charge of cleanup of the north entrance to town--the area from the turnoff to the high school and the bridge. Spicer said that the job will consist of clearing weeds and applying weed killer, with the owner's consent. Lundin says that at this point he needs someone to donate the use of a tractor and bush hog and someone to operate it. Anyone wishing to donate labor or equipment is asked to contact Lundin.

Dave Pranger is coordinating the clean up of Willow Creek between the bridge on May Street and the bridge at the entrance to town. Pranger says that members of the Heppner High School senior class will be on the creek clean up committee, but anyone interested in helping should contact him. He said they especially need people who have hip boots who could walk down the creek to remove debris. Pranger is also asking people who live along the creek to remove the debris from the banks adjoining their property.

Spicer said that clubs in the area are being asked to provide workers for the clean up and that she is hoping for around 150 volunteers. The Soroptimist Club has already volunteered 15 to 20 ladies, she said. Clean up will begin early in the morning on March 9 and should be completed around 11 a.m. Volunteers are being asked to bring gloves, brooms, rakes, shovels, etc. Contact clean up coordinators to volunteer and for information as to what specific tools should be brought. Spicer said that there will be a dumping site for debris.
