Ione class makes money in 'Market'

After the first week in trading in the Stock Market Game the Ione High School Personal Finance class had total assets of \$102,498. The team consists of Erika Bergstrom, Justin Miller, Tony Bjerkje and Shawn Wilson.

The class ranked first of 43 teams participating in the eastern region and sixth among 675 Oregon teams participating at the state level.

Ione High School Personal Finance class started participating in the stock market game on Feb. 15. The primary purpose of SMG is to provide an interesting and motivating device for learning about economics, financial markets and the

stock market.

This game is sponsored by the Securities Industry Foundation for Economic Education and The Oregon State University Center for Economic Education, who hope to get more people interested in the stock market.

The goal is to take an initial \$100,000 and invest it in the market, and try to make as much money as possible during a 10-week session.

The class has been divided into five teams with a captain who is in charge of the group, the secretary who records the transactions and the grapher who graphs the day's progressions of the Dow-Jones daily.

Museum curator speaks to Topic Club

County to enforce zoning

As the result of an ever-increasing number of complaints concerning violations of the Morrow County Zoning Ordinance, which regulates how people use their land, the Morrow County Planning Commission has directed the planning department to begin an enforcement program, according to Kent Goodyear, Morrow County Planning Commission chairman. The county court, in turn, has hired an emergency data processor. This individual will devote one-quarter of her time to code enforcement under the direction of the planning department.

"Violations of land use laws are

primarily in the areas of: too many animals, garbage (junk), storage of inoperable vehicles, and in some cases, too many dwelling units per tax lot. Zoning (land use regulations) were adopted by Morrow County citizens to protect the value and integrity of their neighborhoods from unsightly and aggravating nuisances," said Goodyear. "Being a good neighbor and price of ownership would go a long way in eliminating the problem. All violators will first be made aware of the violation and given a reasonable time in which to comply. Failure to comply will result in fines and court actions," he added.
