

Heppner junior high competes in five way meet



Seventh grader Melissa Miller is a serious threat in eight different events. She will concentrate on 300m hurdles, 1200m, long jump and medley relay at the BMCC meet.

The Heppner Junior High boys and girls track team traveled to Umatilla May 2 for a five team meet. The girls team turned in many personal bests that led them to capture the first place team title for the second time this season. Taking first places were Melissa Miller in hurdles and medley relay; Jossie Evans in 200 m and medley relay; Renee Devin in the medley relay; Kelsie Evans in 400 and 800 m; and Rondi Robinson with a first in

medley relay.

The district championships at Blue Mountain Community College Thursday, May 9 will be seventh and eighth graders competing against their own grade level.

Seventh grade finishes were: Melissa Miller first-300 m hurdles and medley relay; second-1200 m. Jossie Evans first-200 m and medley relay; second-100 m. Jessica Sumner second-100 m hurdles; fifth-400 m relay.

Cattlemen and women to hold meeting May 14-16

Cattle producers throughout Oregon will be in Umatilla May 14-16 for the quarterly board of directors meeting of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association and the Oregon CattleWomen. The meetings will be held at the Heather Inn in Umatilla.

Members will tour the Umatilla County area on Tuesday, visiting the Columbia Crest Winery in Patterson, Wash., and the Double M Ranch. The ranch, owned by Mike and Diana Hopper, is outside the community of Umatilla and last year was cited by the Beef Improvement Federation as one of the top operations in the nation.

Polly Owen, newly-elected secretary-treasurer of the National Live Stock and Meat Board, will be the luncheon speaker Wednesday noon at the Heather Inn. Owen, from Eugene, just completed a term as national chair of the Beef Industry Council, the promotional arm of the beef cattle industry. Cattlemen and cattlemen will be treated to a reception that evening hosted by the Pendleton Grain Growers and Northwest Livestock Commission.

On Thursday, the producers will be guests for a joint meeting of the Hermiston Rotary Club, also scheduled for the Heather Inn. Featured speaker will be Mick Scott, executive director of the Oregon Beef Council. The subject will be the "Cowboys Then and Now" museum now being developed in Portland. The museum, which will trace the evolution of the cowboy and the cattle industry in America will be the first of its kind in the nation when it opens this fall just three blocks from the Oregon Convention Center.

Business meetings will be held all day Wednesday with the board meetings of the two industry organizations scheduled Thursday morning.

The boards of the Oregon Cattlemen and CattleWomen represent more than 10,000 cattle producers throughout the state. Cattle and calves make up the largest segment of Oregon's \$2.7 billion agricultural industry. OCA is one of the oldest and largest trade associations in the state, dating from 1913 when it was formed in Baker City.

Grieb Angus recognized by Assoc.

Grieb Angus, Lexington, has been recognized nationally by the American Angus Association for having three registered Angus cows included in the American Angus Association's 1991 Pathfinder Report.

Only 1092 of the more than 22,000 members of the American Angus Association are represented in this year's report, according to Richard Spader, executive vice president of the American Angus Association with headquarters in St. Joseph, Missouri.

The Pathfinder Program identifies superior Angus cows based upon recorded performance traits that are economically important to efficient beef production. These traits include

regular calving and heavy weaning weights, reports John Crouch, director of performance programs for the American Angus Association. All registered Angus cows that meet the strict Pathfinder standards are listed, along with their owners, in the Pathfinder Report which is published annually by the American Angus Association.

The 1991 Pathfinder Report lists 3,947 individual cows. It is published in the May issue of the Angus Journal and extra copies are available from the American Angus Association. The largest number of Pathfinder cows from a single herd this year is 102, and several hundred breeders have a single cow that qualifies for the exclusive listing.

TO NOMINATE BY PETITION

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is accepting nominations for County Committee elections for Umatilla, Morrow and Gilliam Counties. This notice is issued to inform eligible voters of the right to nominate candidates by petition. Copies of the petition and instructions on its completion can be obtained from your local FmHA office.

Persons nominated should have an interest in a farm as an owner, tenant or sharecropper within the county or area in which activities of the county or area committee are carried out. They must be citizens of the United States or aliens lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence and be well qualified for committee work. Spouses of those persons who meet the eligibility criteria are also eligible for nomination for election to the county committee. Nominations must be received in Pendleton County Office no later than May 20, 1991. FmHA committee elections are open to all eligible voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, political affiliation, marital status, sex and/or handicap.
