Wilson retire after 24 years of teaching

After 24 years of teaching at Lone High School, Darrel and Bev Wilson are pulling up stakes and moving to Post Falls, Idaho, at the end of summer. Looking forward to a more

relaxed lifestyle and more time to pursue their leisure time activities, the Wilsons both retired from IHS at the end of this school year. Darrel's position was in math and science but as in most small schools, he filled in with other duties including the driver's education program. Bev served as a media technician in the high school library. A farewell potluck was held for the Wilsons Saturday, June 29 at the Lone Legion Hall, starting at 4 p.m. A money tree will be available.

Darrel, originally from Nebraska and Bev, from Iowa, met at Wayne State Teacher's College in Nebraska over 40 years ago. He was a senior and she was a freshman at the time. They married after he graduated so Bev did not complete the teacher's program. Upon graduation, Darrel wasn't sure that he really wanted to teach, especially with wages in the neighborhood of \$2,800 to \$2,900 a year. So for the first six years of their marriage, he worked as a carpenter in such places as Greeley and Boulder, Colorado and Hopkins, MN. Under much pressure from friends and family to use his teaching degree, Darrel took a job in Nevis, Minnesota, a town of 350. The Wilsons stayed in Nevis for 10 years before tiring of the long Minnesota winters and deciding to move west. With their sites set on Oregon, they found an opening in Lone, the sunny east side of the state.

As luck would have it, the principal at the time was another native of Northern Minnesota, Harold Beggs. Beggs remembered Darrel from a basketball game where he was filling in for the regular Nevis coach.

Fortunately, Darrel's team lost after putting forth a gallant effort. That loss undoubtedly furthered Darrel's career chances in Lone because, according to Bev, Harold Beggs did not like to lose.

Darrel was hired at Lone without an interview and they came to their new home sight unseen. They came with the idea that Lone would be a starting point, and that they could look around for another job if it didn't suit them. Obviously, it suited them just fine, since they stayed 24 years. "We've enjoyed it," said Bev Wilson. "I came with the idea that I would like it here—we think it is pretty around here."

The Wilsons are planning to move to their new home in Post Falls in September. They chose that area because the summers tend to be more moderate and for the ample

The County of Morrow will hold a public hearing on the 31st day of July, 1991 at 7:30 o'clock p.m., at Boardman City Hall, 206 Main Street North, Boardman, Oregon, to hear and consider any objections to or arguments in favor there may be upon the matter of the formation of a Library District in the Boardman area. All interested persons may appear and be heard.

The Morrow County Court has entered an order declaring its intention to initiate formation of said district.

The purpose for which the district is to be formed is to facilitate general library services to the public, including, but not limited to, providing the following:

- (1) non-fiction, fiction, and large print books on loan;
- (2) periodicals on loan;
- (3) cassette and laser disc video material;
- (4) reference material;
- (5) on-line computer reference and interlibrary loan material;
- (6) on-line access to state library computer data bases;
- (7) children's library material and story hours;
- (8) meeting locale;
- (9) literacy and information access services;

The name of the proposed district is "The Boardman Special Library District", and its boundaries are identical to the boundaries of Morrow County Voting Precincts Number 1 and Number 2, more specifically described as follows:

Beginning at the junction of the Columbia River and the line between Range 25 EWM and Range 26 EWM; thence South along said line to the North line of I-84; thence West along the North line of I-84 to the Morrow County line thence North to the Columbia River; thence East along the South boundary of the Columbia River to the point of beginning. ALSO: Beginning at the intersection point of the South line of I-84 and the West line of South Main, Boardman; thence South to the SE corner of the SW 1/4 SW 1/4, Section 21, Range 25 EWM, Township 4 North; thence West to the line between Sections 20 and 21; thence South to the line between Township 2 North and Township 3 North; thence West to the Morrow County line; thence North along the Morrow County line to the South boundary of I-84; thence East along the South line of I-84 to the point of beginning, and also beginning at the intersection point of the South line of I-84 and the West line of the South Main, Boardman; thence South to the South East corner of the South West 1/4 South West 1/4, Section 21 Range 25 EWM, Township 4 North; thence West to the line between Sections 20 and 21; thence South to the line between Township 2 North and Township 3 North; thence East to the line between Range 25 EWM and Range 26 EWM; thence North to the South line of I-84; thence West along the South line of I-84 to the point of beginning.

All being in Morrow County, State of Oregon.

Wayne Evans has been elected chairman of the Oregon Beef Council, the education and promotional arm of the state's \$363 million beef cattle industry.

Elected vice chairman was Jim Chapman who heads a ranching operation outside Klamath Falls. Turner dairy farmer Arthur Van Veldhuizen, immediate past council chairman, will serve a term as treasurer. The action took place during the council's annual meeting held in Salem.

Evans, a Heppner cattle and wheat rancher is a partner in the family owned Evans ranches. He served as vice-chairman of the council for the past two years. He is a past president of Morrow County Livestock Growers, is a director of the Morrow County Rodeo and a member of the Oregon Wheat Growers League. He also is a past vice president of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association and served on several OCA committees.

The new council chairman is a native of Heppner who was graduated from Oregon State University. His wife Susan, is a former president of the Oregon Cattlewomen's Association. They have a daughter, Kelsie, 14.

Council members nominated Van Veldhuizen as Oregon's director on the National Live Stock and Meat Board. Also announced was the appointment of Bob Beck of Antelope to the council. Beck replaces Reid Johnson, who retired from the council after six years of service. Johnson served as chairman from 1987 to 1989.
