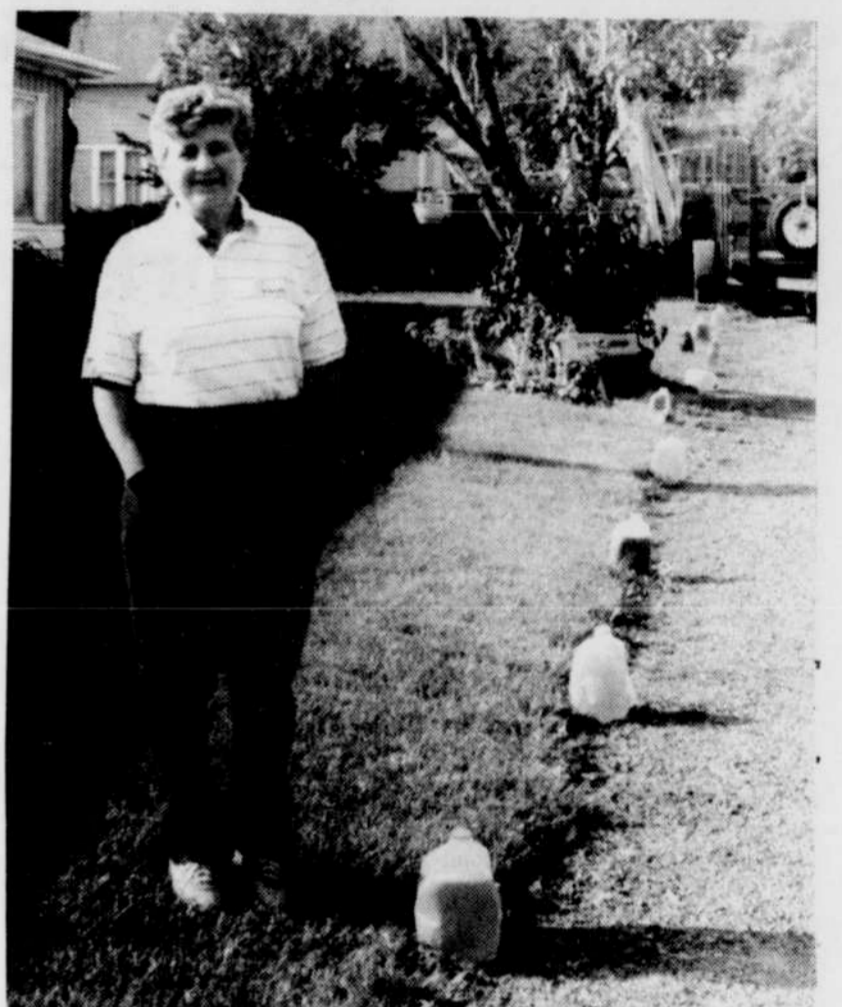

Rita Bowman of Heppner says that the colored jugs do work. She says that since they put the jugs on the edge of their lawn, they've had much less of a problem.
