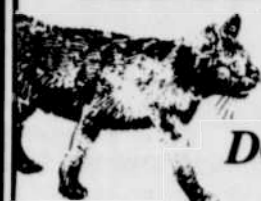

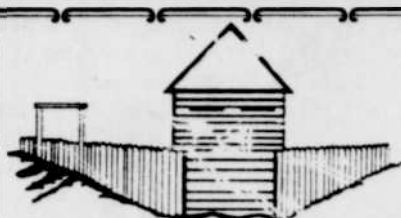

HHS football team opens season Friday

The 1991 edition of the Heppner High School football team will open their season Friday, Sept. 6 with a home game hosting the Union Bobcats. Game time for the non-league tilt is 7:30 p.m.

The Mustangs return nine lettermen but only two offensive starters and two defensive starters. Only five seniors dot the roster. Coach Greg Grant welcomed 41 players out for daily doubles August 14. This year's Mustang team will try to rebuild after losing 13 seniors which included eight all-league players, including shrine team participant Rick Osmin. Last year's Mustangs were the league champions with a 5-0 record. They lost a heartbreaker to the Grant Union Prospectors, 14-11, in the state quarterfinal playoffs.

Jim "Wild Thing" Kindel, a 5'11" 200 pound senior, returns on the defensive line and will be one of the primary ball carriers for the Mustangs. Jason Britt, a 5'9" 170 lb. senior returns at both tight end and linebacker. Ryan Pence, a 5'11" 200 lb. junior, is the other returning starter at offensive guard.

Coach Grant says this year's Mustangs will be "young and inexperienced but will improve quickly. This team is very intelligent and, as a group, hard workers. However we will be small and our team speed is below average."

Grant said the Mustangs will employ both a four-man front and a five man front on defense. Ryan Currin, a 5'10" 180 lb. senior, DeWayne Dunaway, a 6'2" 190 lb. sophomore and Tony Burt a 6'3" 190 lb. junior will share time at defensive end.

Kindel, Charlie Rathbun, 5'10" 170 lb. senior, Shane Munkers, 5'10" 170 lb. junior and Kevin Kilkenny 5'10" 170 lb. junior will anchor the defensive front. Britt, Travis Greenup, 5'10" 170 lb. senior and Currin will alternate at linebacker.

The secondary will be young with two juniors and two sophomores as likely starters. Juniors Scott Coe, 5'10" 170 lbs and T.R. Riehl, 5'9" 160 lbs. will start at the corners while sophomores Len Brittner, 6' 150 lb and Kevin Payne, 5'10" 150 lbs. will line up at the safeties.

Heppner will use a wishbone offense with multiple sets. Grant says he favors that offensive set. "We can tailor the sets to our personnel each year. We hope to throw the ball earlier this year," Grant noted, as the Mustangs lost Doug Devin, Cory

Grabeel, Bob Krein and Osmin from the all-league backfield last year.

Kindel, Coe, Riehl and Payne will line up behind quarterback Rick Koffler, a 5'11" 160 lb. sophomore. Greenup, Munkers, Kilkenny, Dunaway and Pence, along with Joe Lindsay, a 5'11" 170 lb. sophomore, will fill spots along the offensive line. Wide receivers will include Currin, Britt, Brittner and Burt.

The Mustangs will play four non-league games this year, along with four league games. The once powerful Columbia Basin Conference has shrunk to five teams with Wasco County and Pilot Rock both fielding 8-man teams as their numbers are down. Both the first and second place teams will advance to the

Fire blight serious for apple, pear trees

If portions of your apple or pear tree look like they have been scorched or burned, you could have fire blight. Twigs, branches and fruit take on the appearance of scorched wood, dying from the tip down.

Fire blight is a serious bacterial disease of pear and apple trees, and can affect a number of other plants as well, including mountain ash trees, hawthorn, pyracantha, and cotoneaster.

The disease is spread by insects, pruning tools, and splashing rains. The bacteria enter healthy blossoms. It is necessary to have a temperature of 65° F. and either a trace of rain or heavy humidity in order to have an infection.

Fire blight occurs sporadically in eastern Oregon, but is less common in the Willamette Valley. In a "fire blight year" young trees and especially those trained to a central leader can be severely damaged by the disease.

Control is to remove and immediately burn all traces of blight whenever noticed. When pruning a tree suspected of having fire blight, it is necessary to disinfect the pruning tool after each successive cut. A solution of 10 percent clorox bleach and water is an effective disinfectant.

During the spring and summer, cut at least 12 to 15 inches beyond any visible discoloration. In the dormant season, cutting four to six inches beyond discoloration is enough.

Paint wounds with a pruning paint to limit reinfection. Do not apply fertilizer except in moderate amounts, since it encourages root and shoot growth, and makes the tree more susceptible to infection.

There are fire blight resistant varieties of most trees. Since the disease is so widespread, it makes sense to plant a resistant variety. Check with your nursery or the extension office for names of resistant varieties.

Morrow County deputy made contact with an Irrigon resident regarding threats received. Matter was resolved.

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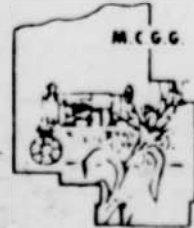


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
