

Lady Cards start season with jittery loss, impressive win

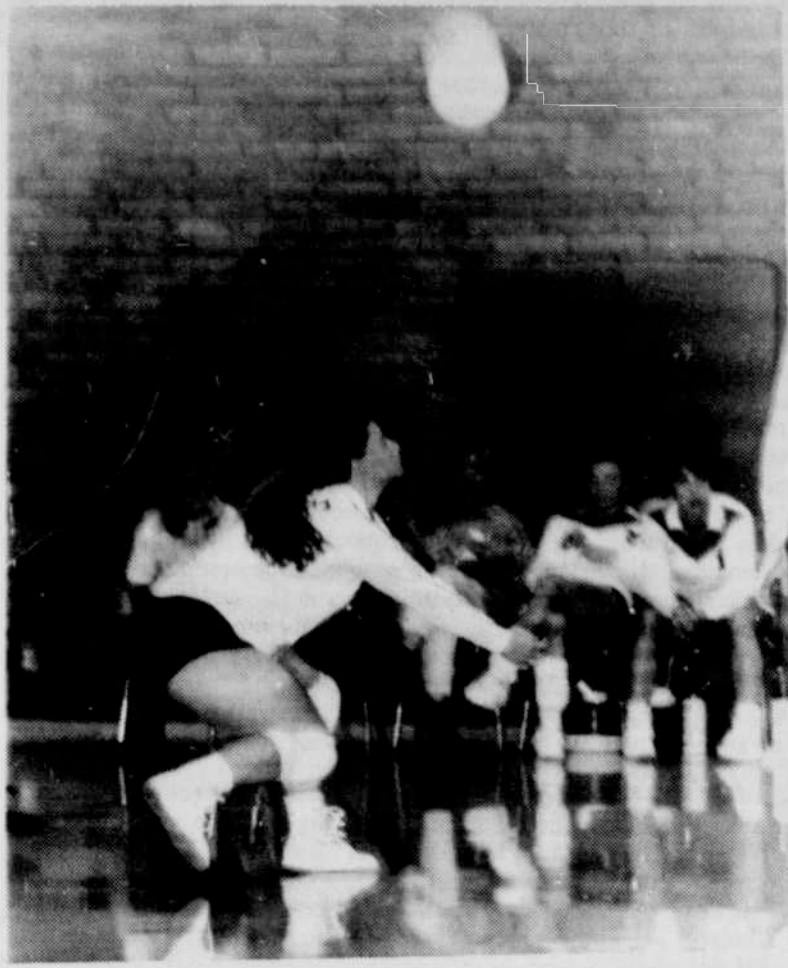

The lone Lady Cardinals and their new coach, Greg Likens, started off the 1991 volleyball season with a jittery loss to Riverside last Thursday and an impressive, more organized showing at the Riverside Tournament on Saturday.

Riverside pounced on the nervous Cardinal squad on lone's home court Sept. 5, winning the match 15-8, 15-7. Coach Likens said the team on the floor at Boardman bore no resemblance to the one that had been diligently practicing at lone for so long. "They were so excited, they didn't know they were playing a game," said Likens. Nancy Morter was the high scorer for the lady Cardinals with five points and perfect eight for eight serving.

The Riverside tournament started out with round-robin play to determine the seeding. The lady Cards opened play against powerhouse The Dalles, with much the same look as in their Thursday Riverside game. The jittery Cards dropped the first game, 2-15 and the second one 8-15,

although they played much better in the second game.

Finding their rhythm, they defeated Enterprise, 17-15, in the first game, but relaxed and "got caught" in the second, where they were tagged with an 8-15 loss.

Progressing into full match play, the Lady Cards came face to face with their familiar cross-county rival, Riverside. Determined to avenge their Thursday loss, the Lady Cards took the hard fought match, 15-9, 4-15, 18-16. After winning the first game, the Cardinals lost concentration in the second, allowing the Pirates an easy win. Doing things the hard way, lone rallied from a 7-13 deficit to grab the win in the third game.

From there, they advanced to the semi-finals, where they met the hard-hitting team from The Dalles. Although the Cards played better, they were no match for The Dalles, a tall team that returned many from a very successful team last year. Scores from that match were 8-15,

5-15.

The final match of the day was against Imbler for third place. By that time, the girls were on the way to running out of steam after a long day of volleyball. Summoning what was left of their energy, the lady Cards came through in the clutch for an 18-16 first game win, then cruised to a 15-2 victory in the second when Imbler appeared to give up.

Nancy Morter led the Cardinals in scoring for the tourney with 26 points. She continued her perfect serving, going 45-45 in that department with six aces. She was also 22 of 27 in hitting with eight kills.

Brandi Ball followed close behind with 25 points. She served 42 of 48 and had eight aces. She racked up four kills on 15 of 16 hitting.

Janie Cupps played strong at the net with 14 kills on 33 of 37 hitting and seven stuff blocks.

In team statistics the lady Cards had 86 percent serving for the tournament and 85 percent hitting.

The lady Cardinals are scheduled for a home match this Friday, Sept. 13, against Wheeler. Game time is 5 p.m.

Forest Service building progresses Rev Pounds to speak

Construction of the U.S. Forest Service building on Main Street in Heppner is back on track again. Construction had been halted after the discovery of a gasoline storage tank buried on the property. Further work on the project was prevented until the area was determined to be uncontaminated.

Bill Caudle, project superintendent, says that the construction company, Pacific Construction and Development, Inc., Eugene, is in the process of filling the hole left vacant by the storage tank, and trying to get the right elevation to prepare for the concrete slab for the building's foundation. Caudle, who is from Bend, says that the company has been on the job for around three weeks, and that they anticipate that the project will be completed in approximately six months. Caudle says that after the subcontracted masonry

work, PCDI, Inc. hopes to frame the building and get the outer walls and roof on before cold weather sets in, so they are able to work inside during the winter.
