Blue Mountain Community College will be offering a class on sewing sweatshirts this fall. The course, entitled, "Serge or Sew Creative Sweatshirts," will start October 3 and run for four consecutive Thursday nights, 7 to 9 p.m. at the Heppner High School Home Ec room. Sewing machines will be provided at the school, or students may bring sergers with them. According to class instructor Nancy Jepsen of Heppner, the class will cover basic sweatshirt construction with creative alternatives in color blocking and

finishing details. Those with sergers will also work with flatlocking techniques using various decorative threads.
