Knowles scored 84 points Thursday and 78 points Saturday for a total of 162. Nystrom's score of 79 Saturday gave him a score of 161, but the judges, after conferring, upped his score to an 80 and created the tie. Butch and his wife Mary (Healy) live on Buttercreek. Bulldogger Steve Currin took the bulldogging title with the fastest steer wrestling time during the five-day competition. Steve's brother Tony won the same title twice before.
