Mary Goheen, Heppner, seldom misses a major Soroptimist event, especially if it involves overseas travel. She recently returned home after attending the Soroptimist International Convention in Nottingham, England. While aboard, she joined a tour group that visited historic sites in England and Scotland. Goheen says it's a way to recapture history lessons by visiting first-hand the beautiful old castles, cathedrals, museums and some of the architecture dating back to Roman construction. Meeting people and seeing different countries has been part of Goheen's lifestyle. She is a firm believer, she says, in the objectives of Soroptimists. "Soroptimists is a working club," she says that strives for human rights for all people and, in particular, to advance the status of women. Currently there are 94,000 members belonging to 2800 clubs in 94 different countries. Meeting new friends seems to be natural for Goheen who says that one of the club's goals is to develop international understanding and universal friendship. The positive aspect of attending these conventions is to renew acquaintances and exchange correspondence by mail thereafter, she added.

This year the International Convention (held every four years) was at the Concert Hall of the Royal Center in Nottingham, July 29 through August 1. Workshops were held at the University of Nottingham for about 1180 attendees. The affair was hosted by the English clubs, who were excellent hosts, Goheen says. She met old friends from the Tamworth Club in England, that has been the Heppner club's "Friendship Link." Keynote speaker was Margaret Anstee, undersecretary general of the United Nations. Anstee is also the director general of the U.N. based in Vienna. Anstee's speech focused on the
