

Hawks trip Mustangs 20-6

They may have lost the battle but may end up winning the war. The Heppner Mustangs hit the road Friday, Sept. 20, traveling to Central Oregon to face the LaPine Hawks and lost the ball game 20-6. In the end they learned a lot about themselves by playing a tough, veteran and hard hitting playoff-bound team. The experience should help the young Mustangs as they head into league play this Friday.

The Mustangs didn't make it easy on the Cascade conference team. Jason Britt stepped in front of LaPine quarterback Travis Reeser's first pass of the game and intercepted it, setting the Mustangs up on the Hawks 11 yard line. After a penalty and a short gain, junior Scott Coe charged into the end zone from two yards out to put Heppner up 6-0 with only two 1/2 minutes played. The pat attempt was wide left.

Heppner got another big break the next time LaPine had the ball when Ryan Currin recovered a Bo DeForest fumble on the LaPine 46-yard line. Coach Grant dusted off a flanker reverse pass on the first play from scrimmage. The receiver was wide open but the ball was slightly overthrown or it would have been 14-0 Mustangs. The driver stalled and LaPine went to work.

The Mustangs open defense of their CBC League Championship with a home game against the Stanfield Tigers Friday, Sept. 27. Game time is 7:30 p.m. at the Morrow County Fairgrounds.

The Hawks are blessed with a big veteran line and two of the best running backs in the state. Seniors Travis Cook and Bo DeForest each ran five times on an 11-play 53-yard march with Cook squinting 21 yards up the middle for the touchdown. Cook also converted the pat on an option pitch from Reeser and it was 8-6 Hawks with 2:37 left in the first period.

The two teams traded possessions for the remainder of the half. LaPine

almost got into the end zone right before the halftime but a fourth and goal from the four yard line was stuffed by Dwayne Dunaway and Jim Kindle with 16 seconds before intermission.

The second half was even more intense and hardhitting. LaPine was backed up to their own 25-yard line on a 52-yard punt by Kindle. He boomed them all night. They used a 14-play drive, taking almost eight minutes off the clock, to score again on a three-yard blast by cook. The pat was no good and it was 14-6 LaPine.

Heppner had three more chances against the ball control Hawks. LaPine ran 65 plays against the Mustangs while Heppner was only running 35 plays.

LaPine scored a meaningless touchdown with 23 seconds left in the game to make the final score 20-6.

The entire coaching staff of the Mustangs was very upbeat after the loss. They sighted the Mustangs' effort and enthusiasm against what head coach Greg Grant called, "the strongest and most physical team we'll play. They controlled the football against us and we couldn't get any offensive continuity going against them."

Cardinals' season unblemished with victory over Bulldogs

The Ione Cardinals upped their season record unblemished with a last minute victory 34-28 over the Culver Bulldogs last Friday, Sept. 20. The Cards, playing on the road in Central Oregon, kept a first quarter lead until Culver took over in the fourth quarter with a 28-26 edge. With just over a minute to go, the Cardinals capped a last-ditch scoring drive with an eight-yard pass from David Wagenblast to Mike Garrett for the winning score. The win, over previously unbeaten Culver, puts the Cards in a tie for first in the Big Sky Conference with Condon.

The majority of Ione's offensive production came in the air with quarterback, David Wagenblast, throwing for three touchdowns. Wagenblast completed seven of 20 passes for 150 yards. Leading receiver was Ryan Halvorsen who had two completions for 62 yards. Gabe Garcia, Jason Proudfoot and Garrett all scored on pass completions.

The Cards were held to 101 yards on the ground. Garcia was the leading rusher with 74 yards.

The next scheduled opponent for the Cardinals is Arlington Friday, Sept. 27 in Ione. Due to a shortage

of players, Arlington was unable to field a team last week. They hope to have enough recovered players by Friday to fill the roster.

Obituary

Dr. Edward Schaffitz

A memorial graveside service was held for Dr. Edward K. Schaffitz Monday, Sept. 23 at the Heppner Masonic Cemetery.

Dr. Edward K. Schaffitz, 78, died Tuesday, Sept. 17, 1991 at St. Vincent Hospital in Portland. He was born Sept. 2, 1913 in Albany, the son of Emile and Emma O'Hiran Schaffitz.

He attended school in the Albany area, then attended Benson Tech High School in Portland.

Schaffitz served with the U.S. Navy during World War II. He graduated from Pacific University in Forest Grove.

He was married to Helen Carter on May 25, 1940 in Portland. The couple moved to North Bend, where he had an optometrist practice.

In 1953 they moved to Heppner, where he practiced for 32 years, retiring in 1985.

He was a member of the Heppner Masonic Lodge, BPOE Lodge No. 358 and the American Legion. Schaffitz was recognized as father of the year in 1963 in Heppner. He was a father advisor for Rainbow Girls and was the first advisor of the Future Business Leaders of America at Heppner High School.

He was past president of the Heppner Chamber of Commerce, helped form the Willow Creek Country Club and also served as its president.

Survivors include his wife, Helen Schaffitz at the home; daughter Diane Griffey of Escondido, CA; a son Jim Schaffitz of Eugene; and four grandchildren.
