

Lady Cards have rocky start in final week

The first of the week's turbulence was caused by the Sherman County Huskies who downed the Cards in three games, 2-15, 16-14, 4-15. According to coach Greg Likens, the girls had a couple of stretches where they played well, but more where they didn't. In the second game, they came back from a 14-6 deficit to win the game. Unfortunately, the momentum from that win was lost somewhere in the shuffle and they couldn't give the Huskies much of a challenge in the final game.

The JV team also lost at Sherman, falling 4-15, 15-10, 8-15.

On Friday, Ione's senior players, Nancy Morter, Brandi Ball, Kari Morgan and Amy Pointer played their final home game, and walked off with a 15-7, 15-6 victory over Echo. The seniors keyed the Cardinal win in a game their coach called "probably one of the best this year."

Amy Pointer was 7-8 serving with five points. She was 5-5 in hitting with two kills. Nancy Morter was 7-8 serving and scored six points. She also had one kill on 3-4 hitting. Kari Morgan played well at the net with 8-8 hitting and all eight going down for kills. At the serve line, she was 5-7 and had one ace and four points. Brandi Ball was 10-11 in ser-

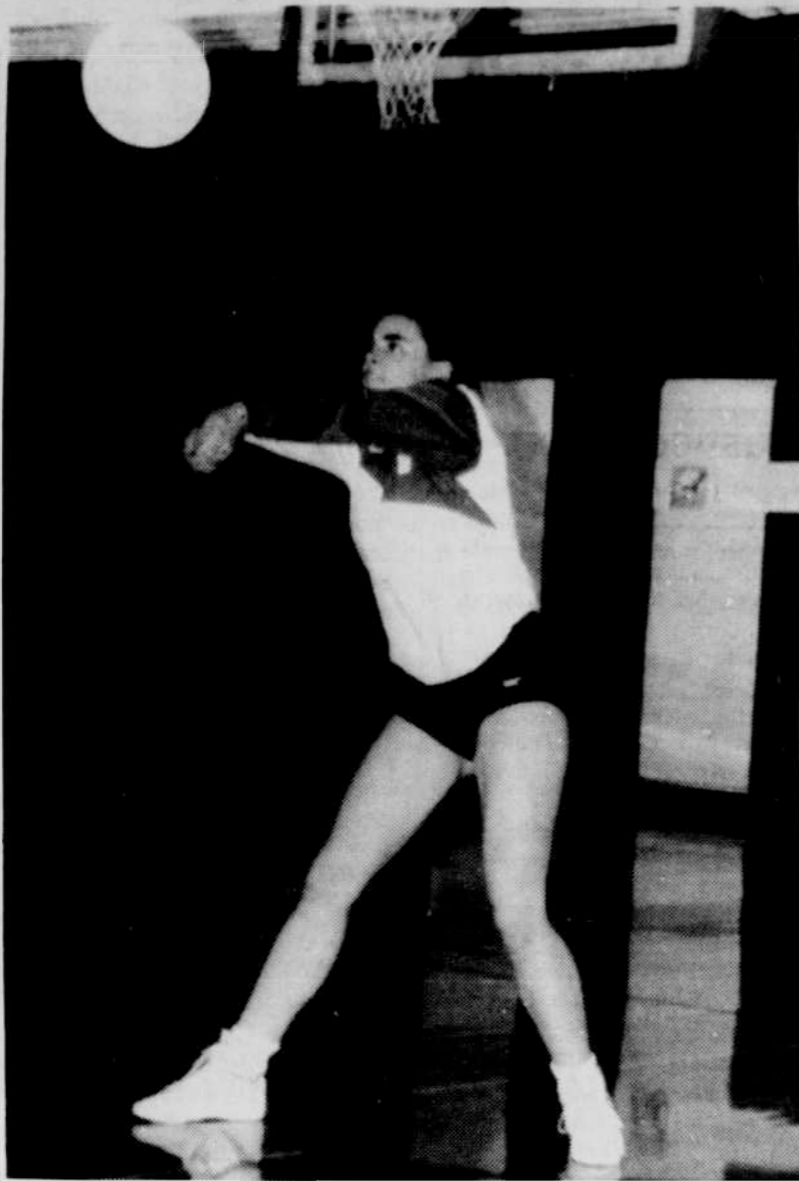

Stokes Landing dedicate garage

A new garage addition was dedicated at Stokes Landing Senior Center with a ribbon cutting on Monday, Oct. 21. A new bus, worth \$43,000, was provided to the Irrigon seniors this past summer from the Oregon Dept. of Transportation. The same type of buses were provided to the Heppner and Hermiston senior groups. The bus is being used to transport people to dinner at the center as well as for recreation. Irrigon seniors had a van which will be transferred to the Milton-Freewater seniors. The van was housed in a garage which was not tall enough for the bus, so plans were made for an addition on the former garage. The old garage will be used for the salvage program and also made into a storage area.

The new garage cost \$6,600 and was built by volunteer labor, which kept the cost of the building down. Most of the workers were senior citizens. The new addition, built according to government standards, is debt free and there is \$900 in a fund to improve the first building. Judge Louis Carlson of Heppner was speaker at the ceremony.

A bus load of 14 people from Irrigon and Boardman recently attended an intergenerational program at the Heppner High School. The bus also took a group of people to an RSVP luncheon in Pendleton Oct. 27.

The attendance at the dinner Monday was 160 people and around 43 dinners were delivered to shut-ins in the community. People from Boardman, Heppner, Stanfield, Hermiston, Umatilla and Pendleton attended.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING
A public hearing will be held on November 18, 1991, at 10 a.m. in Room D at the offices of the Oregon Department of Energy, 625 Marion St. NE, Salem, Oregon.

The Department will receive comments on the proposed issuance of approximately \$3,180,000 in General Obligation Alternative Energy Project Private Activity Bonds and approximately \$1,020,000 million in General Obligation Qualified Small Issue Private Activity Bonds. The bond proceeds will be used to finance the following energy projects.

A loan to the Owyhee Irrigation District, the owner, of approximately \$1,000,000. The loan will fund completion of a hydroelectric generation project at the mouth of the Owyhee Reservoir, Malheur County, Oregon.

A loan to Praegitzer Industries, Inc., the owner, of approximately \$1,000,000. The loan will fund purchase and installation of six copper regeneration units, associated components and an energy management system. Praegitzer Industries is located at 1270 Monmouth Cut-Off Rd., Dallas, Oregon.

A loan of approximately \$1,000,000 to the Middle Fork Irrigation District, the owner, to fund construction of a new spillway and fish ladder on the Clear Branch Dam. The Clear Branch Dam is located at Lawrance Lake in Hood River County, Oregon.

A loan of approximately \$1,000,000 to Heppner Generating Company, the owner, to fund purchase and installation of electrostatic precipitators. Heppner Generating Company is a subsidiary of Kinzua Corporation. The precipitators will be incorporated into Heppner Generating Company's cogeneration facility located at the Kinzua Corporation sawmill. The Kinzua Corporation Sawmill is 2 miles North of Heppner, Oregon, on Hwy 207.

A loan of approximately \$125,000 to the Peninsula Children's Center, the owner, to fund energy conservation measures in the Center's new facility. The facility will be located at 4720 N. Maryland, Portland, Oregon.
