Ranger District to host open house

The Heppner Ranger District of the Umatilla National Forest will be hosting an open house to address access management and the forest health situation in the Blue Mountains on Thursday, November 14 at the St. Patrick's Senior Center in Heppner. The open house will begin at 8 p.m.

Forest Service personnel will be on hand to discuss proposed changes in forest access management and the forest health on the district. Information and displays regarding access management and the proposed 1992 salvage sales will be available for public review. The district invites the public to take this opportunity to stop in, view the proposed projects and become involved in the planning process.

Children's health focus of teleconference

Improving children's nutrition and health is the focus of the Dairy Council of Michigan and the Food and Drug Administration's three hour video teleconference scheduled for November 7.

The conference may be viewed in the Morrow County Extension Office conference room, 430 Heppner/Lexington Highway (Pettyjohn building) in Heppner. Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. for those who wish to get CE credits. The transmission will begin at 10 a.m. The conference will conclude at 1 p.m.

Conference organizers have arranged for Continuing Education Credits from the following: registered dietitians, registered dietetic technicians, certified home economists, certified dietary managers, certified food service employees and American Nurses Association (\$3 fee). For credit you must register on-site prior to viewing the conference. There are no other fees for attendance.

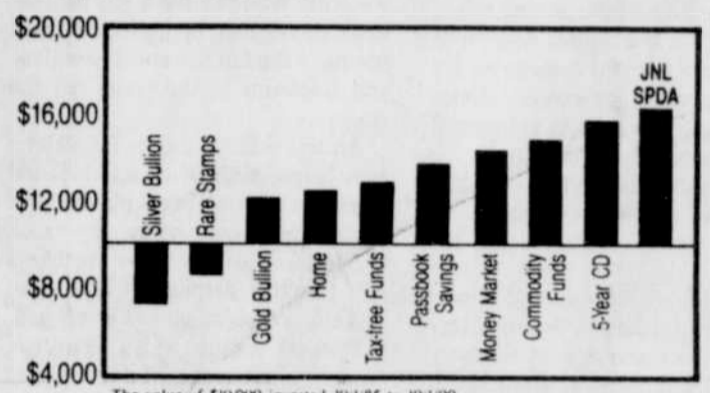
