## Volunteers donate time for low income



Volunteers load wood for low income families

Around 50 volunteers donated their time and energy to split, saw and chop wood Oct. 19, to provide free heating assistance for Morrow County's low income families.

The joint effort of people from all over the county was an intergenerational, all-out effort, said Merri Reamer, senior resource specialist of ECOAC.

Project coordinators were Joyce Breeding, director of Heppner's Neighborhood Center, Paul Sumner from Kinzua and Ruth Adams, director of the Irrigation/Boardman Emergency Assistance Center.

The goal was to secure about 20 cords of wood to be divided between different centers in the north and south, Reamer said. "And we certainly got more than we bargained for."

Kinzua Mill was asked for the donation of logs. Due to prohibited wood cutting during the long hot fall, volunteers had been unable to cut wood in the mountains. Kinzua Manager Frank Pearson agreed to donate two truck loads of logs that were unloaded at Kinzua's log yard.

Volunteering their time and energy to saw up the logs were Kinzua employees Rick Johnston, Tim

Coe, Juan Tellechea, Russ Brannon, Ivan Bork, Sid Kennedy and Carl Bork. These men spent Friday evening sawing the logs into blocks.

When volunteers arrived early Saturday morning with axes in hand, they made short work out of splitting the wood. With the large crew on hand they cut and loaded all the wood before noon.

And when they broke for lunch, they had a "feast," Reamer said. The food was also donated by private individuals, Boardman Tillicum Club, Kinzua, Greenfield Grange, Heppner Neighborhood Center and the EAC of Boardman and Irrigon.

According to Joyce Breeding, the Heppner Center has already given wood to several needy people in Heppner. Some wood was even delivered that day to elderly seniors. The center already knew of the needs of these people, Breeding said, and if people aren't able to haul their wood, they usually find someone that will.

"It's just one of the ways that our centers and other agencies here locally help take care of our people," Breeding said. The centers are now focusing on providing turkeys and items for Thanksgiving baskets to those who are in need.

## Wheatland Pomona gathers for 4th quarterly meeting

The Wheatland Pomona Grange District #29 met at the Willows Grange Hall on Saturday, Oct. 26 for the fourth quarterly meeting of the year with Master William Alford in the chair.

Reports of the various granges were heard with Master Joe Yocom of Lexington Grange reporting that their group had Mike Nelson as guest speaker and hosted the Blue Mt Fiddlers' concert. Willard French, Willows master reported on programs and the extensive work that had to be done following the wind and hail storm. Eulenna Vaughn of Greenfield reported increased attendance. One of the guests from Cold Springs Grange in Umatilla County reported that a group of them had attended a booster night program in Burbank, WA. with 199 people present. They had a choir and the speaker, the Washington State Overseer was present.

Ag chairman, Lewis Halvorsen reported that everyone was happy to see the fine rains, especially the farmers in the county. The Leg. chairman Kenneth Smouse reported on the two billion dollar loan of food stuffs to Soviet Union and since this loan the price of wheat had raised, considerably. He told that options for grain purchases are now available. Barton Clark told that they need a man from eastern Oregon on the State Ag committee, and that the insurance had a lower loss ratio this past year and that there are more insurance members. Jean Nelson told of the 1993 Oregon trail celebration planned and of a matching funds grant that might be available to help the counties with this. A lengthy discussion was held on the salmon problem in the Columbia, and suggestions concerning how this problem could affect the agriculture in the county and the recreation along the river.

Following a delicious lunch served by the Willows Grange, the 5th degree was given. The degree master, Bob Stevens, Overseer Barton Clark and LAS Judy Stevens were all a part of the former Rhea Creek Grange degree team, with Pomona members filling in the offices. The tableaux were under the direction of Dot Halvorsen. The candidate present was Clarence Buchanan of Lexington Grange and the musician was Margerat Thorper of Columbia Grange.

A public hearing will be held on November 18, 1991, at 10 a.m. in Room D at the offices of the Oregon Department of Energy, 625 Marion St. NE, Salem, Oregon.

The Department will receive comments on the proposed issuance of approximately \$3,180,000 in General Obligation Alternative Energy Project Private Activity Bonds and approximately \$1,020,000 million in General Obligation Qualified Small Issue Private Activity Bonds. The bond proceeds will be used to finance the following energy projects.

A loan to the Owyhee Irrigation District, the owner, of approximately \$1,000,000. The loan will fund completion of a hydroelectric generation project at the mouth of the Owyhee Irrigation Tunnel located at the Owyhee Reservoir, Malheur County, Oregon.

A loan to Praegitzer Industries, Inc., the owner, of approximately \$1,000,000. The loan will fund purchase and installation of six copper regeneration units, associated components and an energy management system. Praegitzer Industries is located at 1270 Monmouth Cut-Off Rd., Dallas, Oregon.

A loan of approximately \$1,000,000 to the Middle Fork Irrigation District, the owner, to fund construction of a new spillway and fish ladder on the Clear Branch Dam. The Clear Branch Dam is located at Lawrence Lake in Hood River County, Oregon.

A loan of approximately \$1,000,000 to Heppner Generating Company, the owner, to fund purchase and installation of electrostatic precipitators. Heppner Generating Company is a subsidiary of Kinzua Corporation. The precipitators will be incorporated into Heppner Generating Company's cogeneration facility located at the Kinzua Corporation sawmill. The Kinzua Corporation Sawmill is 2 miles North of Heppner, Oregon, on Hwy 207.

A loan of approximately \$125,000 to the Peninsula Children's Center, the owner, to fund energy conservation measures in the Center's new facility. The facility will be located at 4720 N. Maryland, Portland, Oregon.
