"Who's Who" published by Education Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois, is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. Students are nominated by high school principals and guidance counselors, national youth groups, churches or by the publishing company based upon students' performance in scholarship award contests or extracurricular activities.

Final selection is determined on the basis of criteria which include high achievement in academics and leadership in school activities, athletics or community service. Traditionally 99 percent of students selected have a grade point average of "B" or better and 97 percent are college bound.

The 25th edition of "Who's Who" published in 15 regional volumes features 700,000 students, just over five percent of the nation's 12,000,000 high school students. They represent

18,000 of the 22,000 public, private and parochial high schools in the country.

"Who's Who" students compete for over \$75,000 in scholarship awards and participate in the

publication's annual opinion poll of teen attitudes. The book is distributed to 15,000 high schools, colleges, universities, and public libraries throughout the country.

### After-holiday sales good time to shop

After the winter holiday is a good time to shop for clothing. Stores may begin marking down winter clothing.

Getting clothing you and your family can wear many times while saving money are important goals in buying clothing, notes Carol Bennett, Oregon State University Extension agent in Morrow County.

When you're shopping, consider what you already have. Does the style and color go with clothes and accessories in your closet? A garment requiring additional shoes or coordinating accessories may cost more money than you saved.

If the style or color isn't attractive on you, the sale item may become an expensive closet-filler rather than a working investment. If you're shopping for others, be sure the clothing item is one they want.

As women's clothing becomes more fitted, it's important to try on clothing. Sizing is not standardized. A size 12 in one company's line is not the same as a size 12 in another brand. Sizes may also differ in the amount of ease the designer and manufacturer have allowed for a given style, explains Ardis Koester, OSU Extension textiles and clothing specialist.

Pre-teens and teens should be involved in the selection and purchasing. Don't buy sale items for them if the clothing cannot be returned. Find out the store's policy on returns of sale merchandise.

Next consider quality, including fabric and workmanship. If you are going to wear the garment many times, you want it to hang straight and the buttonholes to remain well stitched. Seams, fasteners, and finishing on the in-

side are indications of quality.

Check the fiber content label and the permanent care label. Consider the care required. Will you wear a garment often and get your money's worth out of it if it has to be dry cleaned or if it requires handwashing with drying flat?

"Sales can be tempting, but they can be expensive if the garments you purchase don't really fill a clothing need. Think about whether you are filling a clothing need or filling a desire to spend money," Koester cautions.
