ONRC official stirs up residents at Lakeview

(Editor's note: The following article, submitted by one of our readers, is reprinted from the Salem Capital Press, Sept. 4.)

Lake County's civic leadership is dominated by people with "small, narrow, closed minds" who have spurned the opportunity to develop a recreation-based economy, one of Oregon's most outspoken environmentalists said here.

Judging from the reaction of Lake County residents who heard the remarks, the feelings are reciprocal.

Andy Kerr, director of conservation for the Portland-based Oregon Natural Resources Council, told members and guests of the Lake County Rotary Club Aug. 26 that local business leaders should turn to tourists as a source of income, rather than relying on the traditional ranching and timber industries.

"There is a prevailing attitude among your leadership that it's 1952, or perhaps 1962," Kerr said. "I believe this leadership is leading you backward, not forward."

Kerr said changing public policy will eventually eliminate federal timber sales that earn no return for the government, as well as livestock grazing on public lands. The result will be fundamental changes in Lake County's social and economic structure, he said.

"Businesses in Lake County have been lazy, being beneficiaries of the federal trough.

But the world is changing and there is risk in your future, and the past is not going to stick around.

"There's going to be less barbed wire sold in this town, and there's going to be more expresso sold in this town," he said.

Asked why Lake County could not develop tourism while ranching and lumbering continued, Kerr said cattle and tourists were incompatible. The presence of "cowpies" on public land will turn visitors away, he said.

"They're aesthetically displeasing, they're dangerous, and they attract flies, which annoy the tourists," he said.

Ranchers and business leaders among the crowd snickered at Kerr's vision of a new tourism-based economy for the county.

Outside the Indian Village Restaurant, where the meeting was held, a shop owner picketed the meeting.

"Many of the people who live here were born and raised here, and they have ties to the land that go back several generations," said John Bach, owner of Don's Market. "They wouldn't want to do anything that harms the environment."

Bach said he was not sorry he missed Kerr's remarks while he stood outside wearing a sign that read, "ONRC has a death wish...YOURS."

"I wouldn't want to talk to him. I have nothing to say to him," Bach said. "He doesn't know the difference between a larkspur and a cattail, I doubt."

Whether Kerr knows his botany or not, he demonstrated familiarity with Lake County's natural resource issues. He outlined his views on matters ranging from a proposed power generation plant at Lake Abert to the recent acquisition by Lake County interests of a ranch that had been sought by The Nature Conservancy.

"I want to congratulate the Warner Valley ranchers for their tactical victory over the Nature Conservancy," Kerr said. "I say 'tactical,' because I think it's temporary. Strategically, nothing's changed, because slowly but surely Eastern Oregon ranchers are going broke."

Kerr alluded briefly to ONRC's plans to seek an end to livestock grazing on public lands.

"My attorneys are salivating to take on the (Bureau of Land Management's) grazing program. It is very much outside the law, and very subject to legal challenge."

Forest Service and BLM officials present for the meeting remained silent but attentive. Ranchers criticized Kerr as being uninformed of Lake County's environment and economy.

"Have you ever been in business for yourself?" asked Matt Outland, a local rancher. Kerr replied with a "no."

"You are trying to dictate to people in a situation you've never been in yourself," Outland said.

About 65 people attended the meeting, well above the usual attendance for the Lake County Rotary Club.
