PUBLIC NOTICE**ATTENTION WATER USERS:**

Oregon law requires any person, corporation or government entity who claims to be a successor to a pre-1909 water use that has not yet been verified, or determined, to file a registration statement with the Water Resources Department by December 31, 1992 (ORS 539.240). A water right is a type of property right attached to the place of use. Even if you were not the property owner when use of water began on land you now own, you may be a successor to a claim to a vested right.

This registration requirement affects people whose claims to water have not been verified by the Circuit Court and who own property where use of water -- began before February 24, 1909, and

-- has been continuous with no more than 5 successive years of nonuse.

Much of the state has already undergone the process whereby the relative rights to uses of claimed water are determined, or adjudicated. The river basins, most of them in Western Oregon, that have not been adjudicated are:

-- Drainages west of the summit of the Coast Range

-- The Umpqua River Basin (except for cow Creek and Roberts Creek)

-- Most basins between the Cascades and Coast Ranges (Willamette River and tributaries upstream from Corvallis and the Molalla-Pudding, Clackamas and Sandy Subbasins)

-- Minor tributaries of the Columbia, Snake and Willamette Rivers

-- Areas in southeastern Oregon

You must file a registration statement if you wish to claim a right to the beneficial use of surface water from any of these unadjudicated surface water sources. Forms and instructions are available at the Water Resources Department in Salem or at any of the regional water-masters' offices. Our Salem address is 3850 Portland Rd. NE, Salem, OR 97310. You may also call us at 378-3739 or 1-800-624-3199. Please ask for the Adjudication Section.

After the December 31, 1992 filing deadline, the Director of the Water Resources Department will commence the adjudication process to determine the relative rights of those who have submitted claims.

Registration statements need not be filed by landowners whose water rights were issued after February 24, 1909, when Oregon's current water code was adopted.

Crop insurance deadline nears

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) has announced that winter wheat growers and producers of other fall-seeded grains will have until April 18, 1993 to revise acreage reports reflecting acreage destroyed or put to another use, to comply with other USDA programs. FCIC decided to delay a long anticipated decision to require growers to pay premiums on all insured acres, regardless of their final use. "The corporation will use the additional time to evaluate grower comments on proposed changes to our policies," said FCIC Manager James Cason.

"We are essentially offering our small grains policies under the same terms in 1993 that we did in 1992," continued Cason. "Because we had a sales closing date of Oct. 31, 1992, it was imperative that interested growers contact their crop insurance agents immediately."
