

Carol Michael-Bennett attends extension meeting in D.C.

Carol Michael-Bennett, extension home economist for Morrow County was one of many home economists from the United States that gathered in Washington, D.C., September 27-October 1 to discuss solutions to a number of current social problems.

Public policy issues such as parental leave, child care, minimum wages and pay equity were among topics discussed by conference keynote Sharon Rodine, former president of the National Women's Political Caucus and chair of its advisory board. She advocated more effective educational programs and policies to support children and young people. Rodine said women "should be encouraged to consider public office in some form as part of their career path and life's work."

More than 1200 Extension home economists attended the annual meeting, which was centered on the theme "Catalyst for Change." Extension home economists serve in local counties to provide research based educational information in areas of concern to today's families. They address issues such as parental care, child care and development, adolescent development, parenting and elder care.

"Preventing problems before they become crises is the most cost-effective way to address the needs of troubled families and children," said NAEHE president Ruth Pirsch of Independence, Missouri. Extension Home Economists offer current research based information to assist and educate families for a better tomorrow."
