School Fund; Cities portion of Road Fund; Fair & Rodeo Fund; and General Fund (which provides funding to Extension Service, Weed Control District, Soil & Water Conservation District, Boardman/Irrigon Emergency Assistance, Morrow County Neighborhood Council, Museum, Justice Court, Juvenile Director, Soil Erosion Control, and Watermaster, as well as those services required by Oregon Law). 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Dry Eyes: Ten Million Americans Suffer

According to a recent issue of *U.S. Pharmacist*, dry eyes is a condition that affects nearly ten million Americans. With dry eyes the quality and quantity of tears produced is inadequate to keep tissues within the eyes healthy. Normal tears consist of three layers - an exterior fatty layer, a water layer, and an inner mucous layer. Nine out of ten cases of dry eyes are due to an inadequate water layer in tears. When dry eyes are caused by an inadequate water layer, the condition is referred to as *keratoconjunctivitis sicca*. This type of dry eyes occurs more frequently among the elderly and women following menopause. Other causes of dry eyes include a deficiency of vitamin A, eye infections, thyroid disease, certain medicines such as isotretinoin, and eye blinking problems such as those that occur with facial paralysis.

Treatment of dry eyes may help reduce the risk of bacterial infection and possibly blindness. Tear substitutes (artificial tears) are commonly prescribed for dry eyes. Active ingredients in artificial tears include polyvinyl alcohol, hydroxypropyl methylcellulose and carboxymethylcellulose. Persons who frequently use these products should consider preservative-free formulas to help minimize potential allergic reactions. If tear replacement is not successful, other measures such as medicine-containing ocular inserts or soft contact lens may provide relief of eye dryness.
