## Obituary

### Henry Robinson

Henry L. Robinson, 97, died Sunday, February 7, at Seneca. At his request there was no funeral service.

A former long-time John Day resident, Henry Robinson was born June 11, 1895, near Hardman to George Henry Robinson and Pauline Kalska Robinson, pioneers who homesteaded in the Blue Mountains.

When Henry was a young boy his father, George Robinson, took his three young sons and a daughter Nellie, from a second marriage, and traveled around the world for several years. The family eventually settled in Australia. Henry and his brother Roy both returned to the United States when they were young men and continued to make Oregon their home.

Henry worked with livestock and in later years used his carpentry skills to build several houses in John Day where he became a well-known figure. He enjoyed hunting and fishing and playing cards.

Henry's mother died when he was a year old. He was also preceded in death by brothers Roy of Heppner and Floyd, Australia, a sister Frances Robinson Donnelly, Spray and a half-sister, Nellie Robinson Cull, Australia.

Survivors include nephews Don and Creston, both of Heppner; a half-sister Grace Robinson Harrison, Couer 'd Lane, Idaho and numerous nephews and nieces in the United States and Australia.
