Cards run off with victory

If the crowd came for excitement, they got it when the Ione Cardinals beat Dufur 78-66 for the boys' championship of the Big Sky League last Friday, Feb. 19 at Umatilla High School.

The Cards watched a 10 point halftime lead dwindle to one with a minute left in the third quarter. With a precarious 53-52 lead, the Cards started nailing three pointers to turn the momentum back in their direction. With a total of five treys, starting late in the third quarter and nine of 14 free throws shooting in the fourth quarter, the Cardinals pulled away to defeat the Rangers, 78-66 and garner a return trip to the 1A State Tournament in Baker City March 3-6.

"They came out shooting in the third quarter. We didn't block out on boards and we didn't move the ball well," commented coach Del LaRue on his team's troubles in the third period. Also Aaron Heideman's offensive presence was not felt since he was on the bench with foul trouble. But in the fourth quarter, Heideman returned and the Cards started to see good ball movement again as well as finding the open man. "I knew we were going to come back and be real strong," commented LaRue.

Aaron Heideman was the Cardinal's high scorer with 17 points. He also had 12 rebounds as the Cards out rebounded the Rangers 48-33.

David Wagenblast had a good game with 15 points, including two three-pointers, 16 assists and five rebounds. "He did a great job of leading us on the floor," noted LaRue.

Jake Bacon led with two steals and Deacon Heideman had four blocked shots in the game.

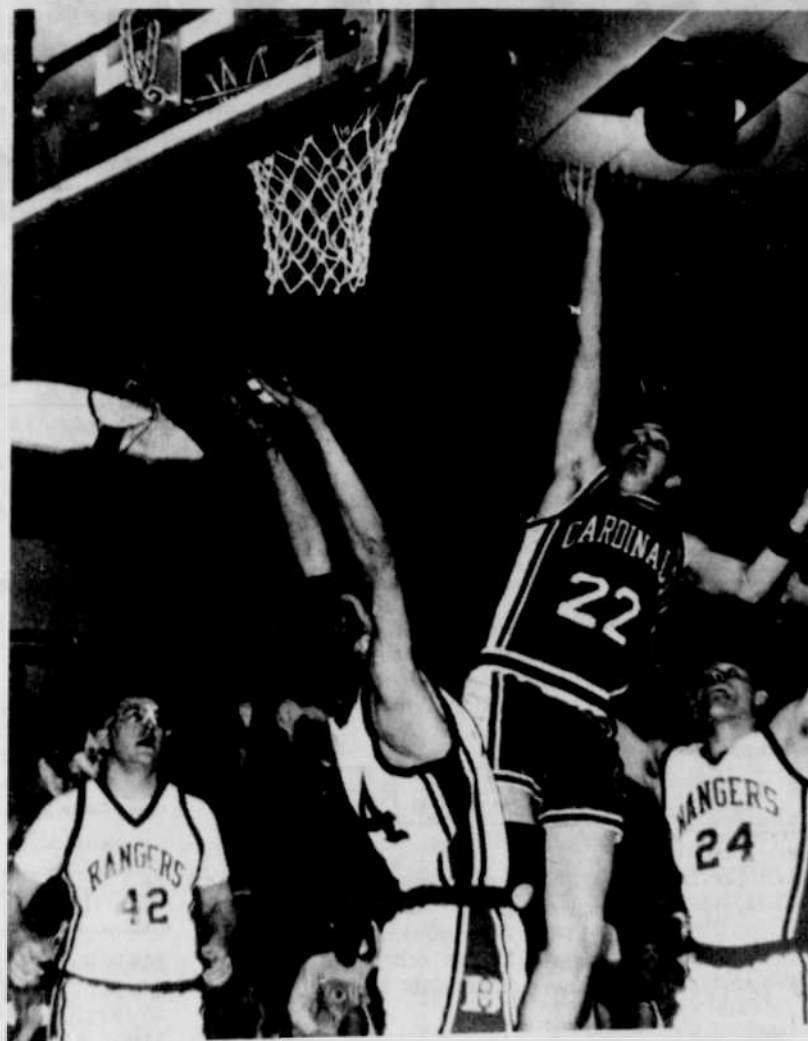

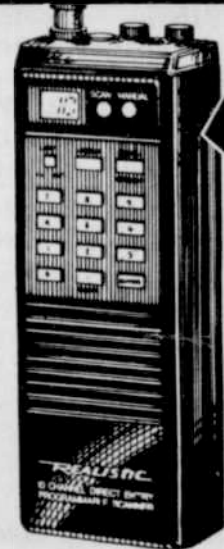

Eye Drops for Open-Angle Glaucoma

Glaucoma is a common eye condition in which there is increased aqueous (water-like) fluid pressure in and around each eye. If the increased pressure is not relieved, damage to the optic nerve and loss of vision can result. Most glaucoma (70 to 90 percent) is of the type referred to as primary open-angle or chronic glaucoma. Drainage of aqueous fluids from within the eye is blocked due to degenerative eye changes. Such changes occur gradually, often over a number of years. Loss of eye sight is so slow that it may not be detected easily. Peripheral vision loss is one of the first visual changes to occur with open-angle glaucoma. The goal of drug therapy is to slow the progress of the disease.

Beta-blocker medicines such as *betaxolol*, *timolol*, and *metipranolol* decrease the production of aqueous fluid. Miotics are medicines such as *pilocarpine* and *echothiopate* which promote the drainage of fluid from the eye. Sympathomimetic amines include *epinephrine* and *dipivefrin*. This group of glaucoma medicines decreases fluid production and promotes fluid drainage as well. Most glaucoma medicines are available in the form of eye drops. When using eye drops, one should instill the correct number of drops in one or both eyes as directed. Place drops in the lower eye lid (pull down the eye lid to form a pouch). Keep the eyes closed for five minutes if possible.
