OSU horse conference planned April 3

The second annual Oregon State University Horse Conference will be held April 3 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on the OSU campus in Corvallis.

The conference is a continuing education program for horse owners, riders and trainers who wish to improve their knowledge

of medical, surgical and preventative health practices affecting the horse. This year's conference will specifically center around equine first aid including colic, traumatic wounds, orthopedic injuries, reproductive and foal emergencies, allergic reactions and various medical problems.

Lectures will be given by veterinarians from the OSU College of Veterinary medicine. The program is jointly sponsored by the College of Veterinary Medicine and the OSU Animal Science Department.

All levels of owner experience are invited to attend; however, lectures are designed for those who are more experienced.

FDA Approved 26 New Drugs in 1992

During the past year, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved 26 new prescription medicines. During the previous year (1991), 30 new products were approved for general use. It often is less expensive to use newly approved medicines than other forms of treatment. For example, a recent report from the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association (PMA) indicates that treatment of gastrointestinal ulcers with medicine is about 25 times less expensive than surgical treatment. A separate study by the PMA indicates that about one-half of all the progress in medical science in the U.S. by the year 2000 will come from advances in new drug products.

On the average, it takes about 12 years for prescription medicines to be approved, starting with product formulation and pre-clinical trials in test animals. Currently the average cost of developing a new drug is over \$200 million.

Of the new medicines approved in 1992, 11 are compounds that provide therapeutic advancement. These 11, which received priority review by the FDA, include sotalol (Betapace), halofantrine (Halfan), zalcitabine (Hivid), itraconazole (Sporanox), sumatriptan (Imitrex), atovaquone (Mepron), mivacurium (Mivacron), rifabutin (Mycobutin), finasteride (Proscar), paclitaxel (Taxol), and teniposide (Vumon).
