For the past six years, Julie and Alvin Ashbeck have been "burning up the miles" as chaperones helping the Morrow County Fair and Rodeo courts promote this annual event.

"There's never a dull moment," Julie says. But the rewarding part is seeing these young girls develop and attain poise as they fulfill their responsibilities as court members, she emphasizes.

It all began when the Ashbeck children, Jodee, Jenni and Andy served as court pennant bearers. And then Jodee and Jenni stepped into the queen's role in 1991 and 1992 respectively. This year these two past queens will carry the official flags during the rodeo and grand entries.

This Buttercreek farm family has the usual busy ranch life. However, Julie also works full time as the head secretary at the Morrow County School District office in Lexington.

The marathon of a chaperone's court duties begins in the fall after the court for the coming year is selected. Then there's the shopping trips and the fitting of outfits for the court's attire. This year the official divided skirt and vest outfits, plus blouses and jackets were fashioned by Sandi Shook, Hermiston, who also has a busy life as the mother of a

Pendleton Round-Up court princess. The princesses outfits of ultrasuede teal are accented by in-lays and miles of fringe.

Luncheons and appearances at public gatherings begins with the queen's coronation usually held in January at the annual Town and Country banquet. Summer weekends are filled with appearances at out-of-town rodeos and festivals. An official visit to the Heppner nursing home is always a special highlight, Julie notes.

No matter how early the pre-dawn hour, Julie says that Alvin is always the first one out the door when it's time to hit the road. But Julie says she is hanging up her chaperone hat after this season.

According to Queen Elizabeth Doherty, "Julie goes the extra mile." The Ashbecks purchased the Black Hills Gold ring that became a fund raiser for the purchase of extra wardrobe items. And Julie has faithfully laundered the queen's white outfit, Queen Elizabeth says.

The Ashbecks claim it has been a memorable year with court families that have formed a close-knit group. And no one will ever forget the camaraderie that is spiced with entertainment by the Doherty family, Julie added.

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
