council holds meeting

The Heppner High School 21st Century Site Council held its monthly meeting on Oct. 27 at the HHS library.

In new business council chair, Bob Sagely, directed that the council send a letter of thanks to Pioneer Memorial Hospital administrator Kevin Erich, for allowing the site council to use the hospital satellite television facilities for its ED-NET inservices in October, November and December.

Also discussed was the HHS staff goal of "peer coaching" program. Peer coaching is a program several Heppner High teachers were trained in two years ago. Teachers help each other through positive mutual class observations and conferences. The staff had expressed an interest in reinstating the program at the high school. The council decided that, though desirable, peer coaching should not be a top priority at this time because the council has a lot to accomplish in the coming months. More discussion of the topic will occur at a later date.

The major item of discussion was the initiation grant application the site council is submitting. After reading through the proposal, the council made some semantic adjustments and discussed the timeline for the grant plan. A top priority for the grant will be for planning the restructuring of the schools as required by Oregon HB3565, the 21st Century Oregon School Reform Act.

The council voiced a strong consensus that the public be made aware, and be given ample opportunity for input when it comes time for the state-mandated restructuring of the schools. HHS must be issuing "Certificates of Initial Mastery" by the 1995-96 school year, as required by the law.

The next site council meeting will be during an ED-NET inservice teleconference Nov. 16 at 3:30 p.m. at Pioneer Memorial Hospital.

MCGG profits hold steady

Profits at the Morrow County Grain Growers held steady last year, better than management had anticipated.

Co-op Manager Larry Mills told members at the annual meeting Monday night that efforts to expand MCGG's market area had paid off in the past year, offsetting a poor 1992 crop.

Mills said the co-op can expect a good year in 1994 thanks to an exceptional harvest in 1993.

Net income for MCGG was up slightly to \$379,333 from the previous year's \$371,659. Sales for the year ending May 31 were up over \$34 million, almost \$1 million more than last year.

The co-op's auditor, Green & Green of Pendleton said MCGG was in good financial condition, with its favorable debt to equity ratio "a very strong position for the company."

Mills said the company had expanded sales into surrounding counties, which helped the company during the past year.

NOTICE OF REVENUE BOND AUTHORIZATION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City Council of the City of Heppner, Morrow County, Oregon (the "City"), adopted Resolution No. 107-93 on October 28, 1993, authorizing the issuance of Street Improvement revenue bonds. The bonds will be issued to finance improvements and repairs to city streets (the "Project").

The City Council may establish by subsequent resolution all terms, conditions and covenants regarding the bonds and the Project revenues which are necessary or desirable to effect the sale of the bonds.

The City estimates that the bonds will be issued in an aggregate amount of not to exceed \$370,000; bond principal and interest are expected to be paid from State Highway Fund revenues. The bonds will not be general obligations of the City, nor a charge upon its tax revenues, but will be payable solely from the revenues which the City pledges to the payment of the bonds.

If written petitions signed by not less than five percent (5%) of the City's electors, are filed at the Office of the City Recorder on or before January 3, 1994 (the 61st day after the date of publication of the notice), the questions of issuing the revenue bonds shall be placed on the ballot at the next legally available election date.

The Office of the City Recorder is located at 188 West Willow Street, Heppner, Oregon 97836.

The resolution authorizing the bonds is available for inspection at the Office of the City Recorder.

The bonds will be issued and sold under the Uniform Revenue Bond Act (ORS 288.805 to 288.945); this Notice is published pursuant to ORS 288.815(6).
