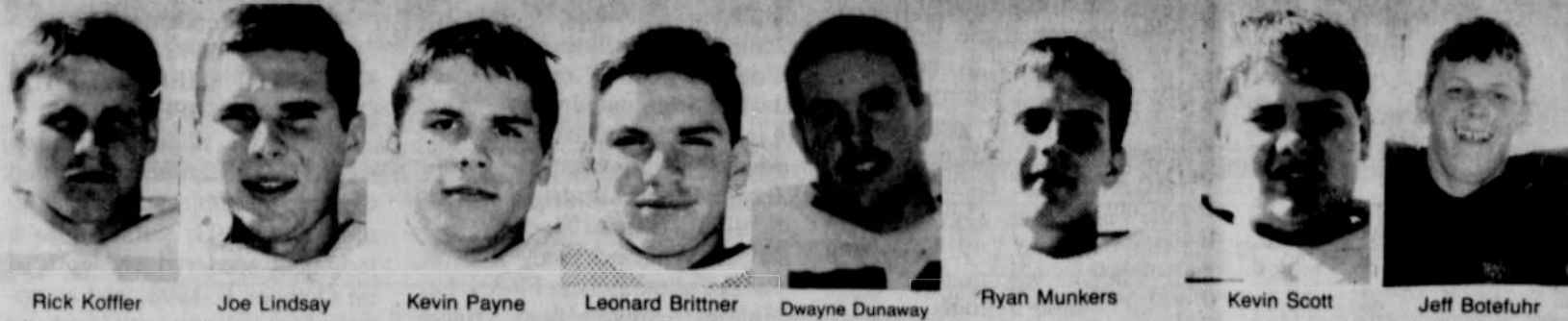


HHS players named to all conference team

Extension workshops to focus on CRP

When Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts begin expiring in 1995, Mid-Columbia Basin producers will be able to make informed decisions about how they want to use the land in the future, if Clark Seavert has his way, says a press release from OSU agriculture communications.

The OSU Extension area farm management agent has scheduled a series of five workshops in Wasco, Sherman and Gilliam counties beginning Nov. 15 and continuing through March 1994. The programs will be held at the Wasco County Resource Center in Maupin, the Kent Baptist Church and at the Gilliam County Fairgrounds in Condon.

CRP, a program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, began in 1985. Its purpose was to reduce wheat production by contracting with farmers to remove highly erodible land from production and following conservation practices, such as planting grass.

With the end of the program in sight, Seavert wants Mid-Columbia producers to be ready when they have to make decisions about how to manage the land in the future, even though USDA has not established regulations concerning land in CRP.

The "CRP: What To Do?" workshops will utilize a computer program called FINPACK, developed by the University of Minnesota, to help growers analyze their financial situation by looking at past and present balance sheets, cash flow statements, and other economic information so they will understand the financial implications of the various options that may be available to them, he explains.

The workshops, which are open to all growers in Morrow, Wheeler, Gilliam, Sherman and Wasco counties, will be "very in depth, very detailed so that any change will be reflected in their financial statements," Seavert stressed. Those enrolling will be expected to complete all five sessions, even if it means going to another community to make-up a meeting.

In addition to the workshops scheduled this winter, Seavert is already planning a second series for 1994-95 that will be tailored to current information and that will help producers decide if they should stay with any government programs, sell or lease the land, fence for livestock, or put the land back into wheat production.

At the end of the two-year program, producers will have the tools to use in making informed decisions, Seavert believes, and also information that will be useful for personal records or for lenders.

Seavert believes growers with

very little or no land in CRP, but who are wondering if they should buy or lease CRP land that might become available, will also benefit from the program, because it will help them analyze costs and returns of expanding their operations.

Youth basketball clinics to feature reknown coaches

The Heppner alumni will sponsor a free basketball clinic Friday and Saturday, Nov. 26 and 27 for students in grades four through eight. Sixth, seventh and eighth graders will meet from 4 to 7 p.m. Friday and 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. Saturday at the high school gymnasium. Fourth and fifth grade boys and girls will meet from 8 to 11 a.m. Saturday at the high school for a shooting clinic.

Former Heppner resident Gene Heliker, an assistant coach with High Five America, will be conducting the clinic. Heliker coaches with two of the most successful coaches in the world Dr. Alexander Gomelski, former Russian National coach and Rle Nichols, founder of Athletes in Action. Dr. Gomelski's Russian Olympic team won the gold medal in 1988. In addition he was a seven time European champion, a five time world champion and author of 12 books on international basketball.

Rle Nichols has a .778 winning record against division I schools, the fourth best among

active college coaches.

Heliker, with Dr. Gomelski and Nichols conduct team clinics, coaches clinics and youth basketball camps. The goal of High Five America youth camps is to teach young athletes their responsibility as a role model to their friends and to show them life skills they will need for success as an adult. Heliker works with Dr. Gomelski to advance Russian training techniques that developed and produced multiple Russian gold medal championships.

Stuart Dick from the Alumni Association will oversee the clinic. Missy Cutsforth, Dana Reid, Lana Orr, Geri Grieb, Ken Eckman, David Allstott, Gary Watkins and John McCabe will assist and high school athletes will help demonstrate skills.

The public is invited to attend all sessions. Area coaches are also invited to preview the innovative and advanced youth coaching techniques.

Seating will be provided in balcony bleachers.
