Historical society enjoys trip to Poulsbo, WA.

The Morrow County Historical Society annual trip was held May 6 through 8. The group departed Ione about 7 a.m. Friday, May 6 after picking up people at Heppner and Lexington. Breakfast was enjoyed at Memaloose Park with coffee, tea, oranges and rolls. Travelers enjoyed the Mt. Hood Railroad trip to Parkdale, where they were met by the bus, then on to McMenamins, a restored 1911 poor farm which now is a pub restaurant and bed and breakfast. The group enjoyed lunch there and was given a short history of the establishment. At the time it was a poor farm it was almost self supporting with cows, chickens, pigs and large gardens. During the depression years it fell into a slump and like many other businesses it failed to continue. In later years it was purchased by the McMenamins brothers who have restored the building and hold many activities there. They hold private parties, weddings, bridal showers and luncheons for many large groups. The hall seats about 250 people. The power station houses a theater with seating for 150 people. They also have a winery and brewery. The place is well landscaped and lovely to look at.

The group then motored to Poulsbo, WA., where they spent two nights. On Saturday they visited the Naval Undersea Museum at Bremerton, WA. There they saw a model of the NK 18 torpedo, one of the most successful torpedoes made to date. In the yard was the Tristan 2, a undersea diving bell which has gone as much as two miles deep and photographs the

undersea sights. The model holds two men. There were also models of other ships with their history. The group then took a ferry to Blake Island and Tillicum Village where they enjoyed fresh clams, and a bountiful baked salmon dinner served by the Tillicum Indians. Following the dinner they were shown a play "Dance of the Wind" with the Tillicum dancers. Here they heard an impressive history of the tribe and their beliefs. In Nov. 1993, they were hosts to one of the most historic meetings to ever take place in the country. They greeted President Clinton and 14 Asia Pacific Economic Corporation leaders from the Pacific rim.

It is believed that the well-known Chief Seattle was born on Blake Island. The words of Chief Seattle were "We, at Tillicum Village urge all to protect this land from harm so that our children's children walk through the sun-speckled forests, walk along the wave washed beaches of the Northwest".

On the return trip several group members enjoyed bits of shopping and sightseeing in downtown Poulsbo, which is patterned after a Norwegian Village. Poulsbo has many interesting shops and a fine view of the water and ships. In the evening the group enjoyed dinner together.

Sunday found the group ready for home. They stopped at the Quality Inn in Centralia where they enjoyed a bountiful and beautiful Mother's Day brunch. The group arrived back home around 5 p.m. tired, but happy. The weather was great for travel and sightseeing. There were 38 passengers and a driver from the Mid Columbia Bus Co.
