Certificate 60557, in the name of Jedediah Aylett, includes a right limited to 0.064 cubic foot per second from wells 1 and 2, with a priority date of May 2, 1965 for irrigation of 5.12 acres.

The points of appropriation for this right are in the SE 1/4 NW 1/4, NW 1/4 SW 1/4, Section 28 T 4 N, R 27 E, WM; Well 1 - 56 chains North and 21.5 chains East, Well 2 - 24.5 chains North and 19.5 chains East, both from the SW corner, Section 28.

Certificate 60553, in the name of Jedediah Aylett, includes a right limited to 0.055 cubic foot per second from a well, with a priority date of March 26, 1956 for irrigation of 4.4 acres.

The applicant proposes to change the character of use and place of use to a gravel pit in the S 1/2 SW 1/4, Section 21, and N 1/2 NW 1/4, Section 28. The applicant also proposed to change the point of appropriation to the NE 1/4 NW 1/4, Section 28, T 4 N, R 27 E, WM; 4940' North and 1350' East from the SW corner, Section 28.

Protests may be filed by persons who think their water right may be injured by this change. Additional information or forms and rules for filing protests are available from the Water Resources Department by calling 378-8455. If a protest is filed a hearing may be held.

Rangeland comment period extended

The comment period for Rangeland Reform '94 proposed rules, that was set to expire July 28, has been extended to September 9, 1994. Comments must be received by the Forest Service by that date. Comments to the Bureau of Land Management must be postmarked by Sept. 9.

According to Bill Myers, executive director of the Public Lands Council, there has been no extension of the comment period which expires August 11, for the environmental impact statement draft. However the Department of the Interior is considering extending the comment period, Myers said.

Commission's plan to aid families

The Morrow County Court has approved the 1995-97 biennial plan for the Morrow County Commission on Children and Families.

According to Dar Merrill, executive director of the commission, the plan is the result of a community mapping process that identified strengths and resources within the county, as well as risks affecting children and families.

The plan was accomplished through three surveys, one for the public, one for businesses and organizations and a youth risk behavior survey given to high school students.

Goals of the plan, in order of priority, include: reducing child abuse; decreasing the teenage pregnancy rate; increasing the percent of babies born to

mothers receiving adequate prenatal care; reducing the juvenile crime rate; increasing the percent of families who are able to care for their own children; decreasing teenage tobacco, alcohol and drug use; increasing the percentage of children entering kindergarten who meet developmental standards for their age; increasing the number of child care slots; increasing the percent of families living above the federal poverty line and increasing the high school graduation rate.

Merrill said that the mapping process identified many organizations, institutions and individuals who are willing to help and will be brought together to help achieve those goals.
