Yakima communities, continued the release. Those who have had contact or have stories about Indians visiting our area in past years are especially invited to join the group for dinner.

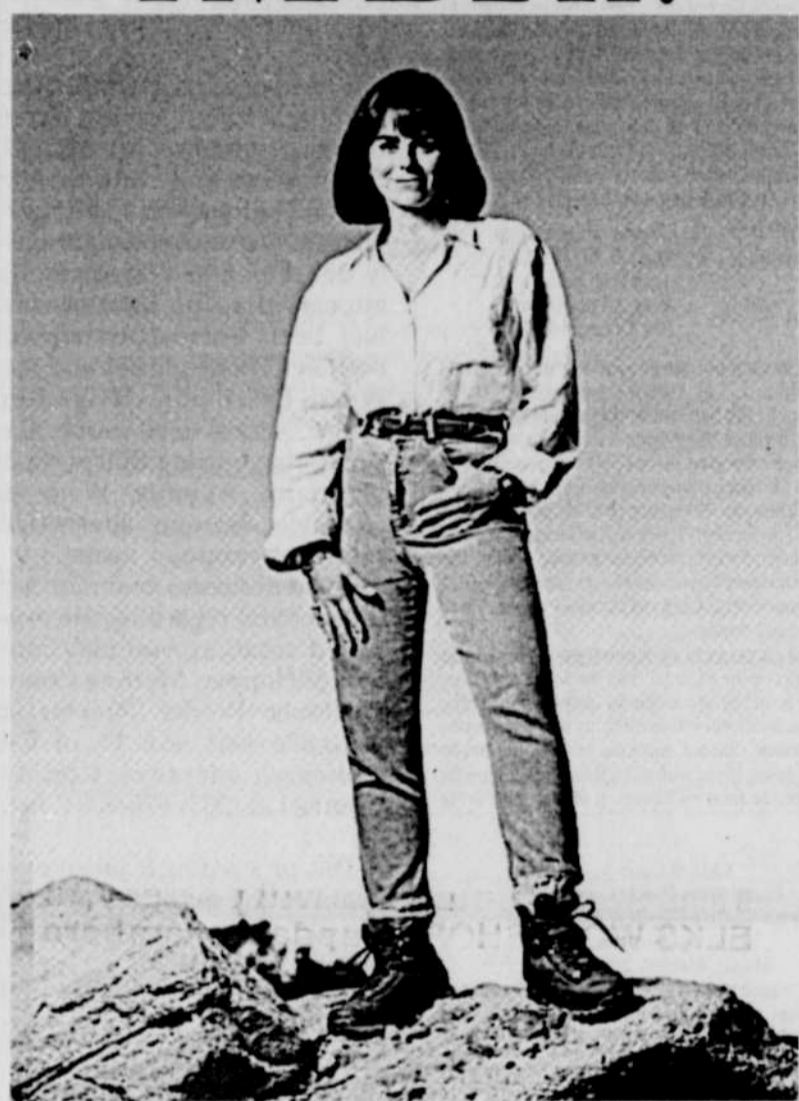

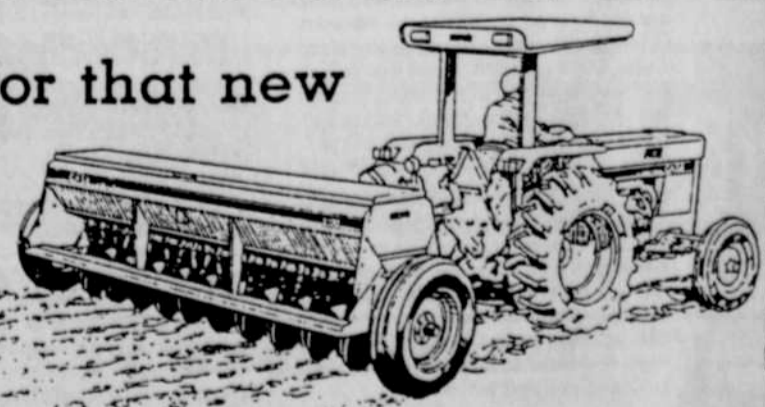
