Vote no on measure 8

To The Editor

Seniors, vote no on Measure 8; it's an attack on seniors-retirees and potential retirees on fixed incomes. The legislature could not pay for the mandated state mandates to local communities and wants to pay for it from the retirement trust account of local government employees, your neighbors.

The sponsors of the initiative use an example of retirees with \$48,000/year retirements. The true facts and figures are:

Section 6, PERS information packet of July 28, 1994: Monthly Benefit Amount No. of Retirees less than \$500/mo, 31,080; \$500-900, 12,845; \$1,000-1,499, 6,681; \$1,500-1,999, 4,247; \$2,000-2,499, 2,804; \$2,500-2,999, 1,533; \$3,000-3,499, 718; \$3,500-3,999, 296; \$4,000-4,499 (\$48,000), 122;

\$4,500-4,999, 53; \$5,000-5,499, 27; \$5,500-5,999, 13; \$6,000-6,499, 8; over \$6,500, 7.

Half of all retirees get checks of less than \$500/month. Of 60,434 retirees on PERS, only 230 make \$48,000 or more. Do you think you can get a PAC 10 coach or university president to work in Oregon for under \$48,000?.

Why penalize local government PERS employees for the inability of the legislature to balance the budget? If lottery dollars were diverted to education instead of economic development, would you have to take money from retirees to balance the budget?

Vote no on measure 8. Support local government services.
