Halloween goblins drafted their own form of trick-or-treat when rain turned to snow. Albeit a bit late in the season, any type of moisture is an aphrodisiac to parched land. Somehow little green spears of winter wheat are bravely poking up through tilled ground as a meager showing of new blades of rangeland grasses lack substance for animals dependent on forage.

Meanwhile fall entertainment centers around sports and hunting. Football is a civilized way for macho-types to take their aggressions out on their peers, while the 'has-beens' and the 'wanna-bees' cheer from the sidelines. There should be a football conditioning program for parents, so that they don't bruise as easily when hitting each other while cheering.

Baseball world series fans are probably recovering from withdrawal pangs. Meanwhile football fanatics can continue with arm chair exercises while they are glued to the television set.

As hunters begin bragging about their accomplishments, I hope that some serious thought has been given to the upcoming ballot measures. Proponents are proposing some serious constitutional changes. But voters should question how well some of these issues have been thought out.

An equal tax measure abolishes Oregon's current tax system in favor of a two percent tax on all transactions. Yet no one seems to know how much money this will generate and the bureaucratic administration of that tax money is mind boggling. Offering a well-structured dedicated sales tax might be more palatable.


It's scary to think of reapportionment of those taxes based on population figures and giving total control to state government. Eastern Oregon rural residents might have to do like the Old Order of Amish and Mennonites. Under the Endangered Species Act, it says that the listing of isolated populations of mammals is allowed. Once a claim is filed with the Federal Interior Department stating that they file for protection, if the listing is approved all federal agencies are supposedly obliged to do everything necessary for survival of population or species.

And then there's the measure requiring the state to give schools automatic budget increases and guarantees. Education is a very important issue, but funding for same at the sacrifice of other public services and higher education shouldn't be the only answer. It's not democratic to ensure that government workers or teachers should be above those of workers who do not have job guarantees, yet pay the salaries of designated people.

Another money issue is the measure to provide full-time work or job training for prison inmates. Depending on resources, many prisons do provide jobs. Doing prison janitorial work or working on road chain gangs might violate prisoners' rights. Can we afford to set up factories inside all prisons when there are law-abiding citizens in need of jobs?

Why do we need to make so many constitution changes when our legislators are supposedly elected to make changes that are in the best interest of the citizens and the economy? Lets hope that voters consider the ramifications of some of these changes, many of which are proposed by special interest groups. Reading the voter pamphlet is time consuming, but well worth the effort, before casting your vote next week.
