Wheatland Pomona holds meeting

Jim Walker, Eastern Oregon State Grange Deputy was the guest at the Wheatland Pomona meeting held recently at the Willows Grange Hall. Mike Medlock, Master of Wheatland was the presiding officer with Kenneth Smouse filling the chair of Assistant and Loretta Lantis as Flora. The business of the day was conducted in the 4th degree. Mr. Walker spoke to the group about the need of younger people especially farmers in the group. We must bear in mind that the Grange is a legislative group and the resolutions sent to the Legislature from the grange has a bearing on many of the decisions not only on the state level but county and city. Walker urged the granges to get more advertising and articles in the local papers about the many activities and contests. He reminded us of the youth organizations of the grange and their activities.

The legislative chairman urged members to study the measures, and read up on what the various candidates hope to do in the coming years and reminded people to be sure and vote, but be knowledgeable of what you are voting for. G.W.A. chairman Wilma Martin told of her visit to the G.W.A. meeting in Greenfield grange and asked that the subordinate chairman be sure and send in the quarterly reports to her as they are needed to help her fill out her Pomona reports. A Letter was read from the state office con-

cerning the community service reports and the need of a chairman in each grange. Under unfinished the business of putting the G.W.A. group back in District 6 from 4 was discussed. The way this can be done is through resolutions from the subordinate granges, concerning their opinion of this. Master, talked on several issues concerning the grangers such as weed control of the Casha which is crowding the roadways and creeping into the fields, and the forestry and the control of the dangerous weeds in the mountains effecting grazing. Plans were made last year for the control of this project through crews, however the fires prevented the planned project to go ahead. Had hoped this could be done without the airplane spraying over the different areas. There was talk on the bird and owl issues, especially hawks, and the need of ponds to hold the run-off. Grange reports were interesting with the Master's and others reporting of the subordinate activities. Spray grange is doing extensive remodeling to their hall, and they have elected officers and the County Deputy accompanied by Dot Halvorsen had been present to install. Greenfield holds card parties one morning a week with people bringing sack lunches, and the plans for card parties the third Sat. evening of each month.

Willows are busy planning the MCGG dinner and the turkey dinner and bazar to be held Nov. 20. They are also

planning to meet on Sunday afternoon during the cold winter months as many members have so far to travel to attend.

Lexington had hosted the Blue Mt. Fiddler's concert and held their regular meetings.

Resolution committee was Roger Scharen, Wilma Martin, Clarence Buchanan and Roberta Medlock.

Due to the fact that Roger and Rosalee Scharen are leaving in January to complete his education working toward a master's degree, an election was held with Bob Hammack of Spray to fill the Overseer's chair.

Lunch was served after which the cake walk was enjoyed, a program which consisted of a talk from Lyndee Minster on the recent trip she won to the U.N. sponsored by Oddfellow and Rebekah lodges. Minster and several others are planning a trip to Europe this summer. A monetary gift was presented to her for her part of the program.

Plans were discussed for the need of a permanent display telling of the grange that can be taken to the fairs this summer, of the Wheatland district. Plans will be discussed at the January meeting.

Youth hunt slated at refuge

The Umatilla National Wildlife Refuge is holding a special youth hunt day on Saturday, December 3, at the McCormack Unit near Irrigon. Selected youth waterfowl hunters aged 15 or younger will be given special reservations to hunt the popular marsh with their adult companions.

Youth hunters aged 14 or 15 must be accompanied by an adult aged 18 or older and youths under age 14 must have

an adult companion at least 21 years old. There will be no hunting blind fees for youths and their adult companions selected for the hunt. All youths participants must have a hunter education certificate and all required licenses and stamps with them on hunt day.

To apply for the Youth Hunt day send a postcard with the youth hunter's name, address and birth date to Youth Hunt Day, Umatilla NWR, P.O. Box 700, Umatilla, OR 97882 postmarked by November 15.
