

Grizzlies no match for Cardinals

The Helix Grizzlies were no match for the highly experienced Cardinal team as the lady Cards beat Helix 75-28 Saturday, Feb. 4. The lady Cardinals jumped to a 25-4 first quarter lead, then the bench came in and added 15 more to take a commanding lead at the half 40-14.

The second half was a repeat of the first as the Cardinals continued to roll to a decisive victory 75-28. The team posted a season high 22 assists, lead by Kim Bedortha with seven. Ten of the Cardinals found their

way to the scoring column. Melissa McElligott and Anne Dombrowski each had 13 points and Mary Jane McCarty and Becky Wagenblast had 10 points apiece.

The lady Cardinals clinched a playoff spot in the district tournament which will be held February 24 and 25. The lady Cardinals improved their record to 16-2 on the season and are a perfect 8-0 in league play.

The Cards face a big game this weekend as they travel to Echo Friday, Feb. 10 in a rematch with the Echo Cougars.

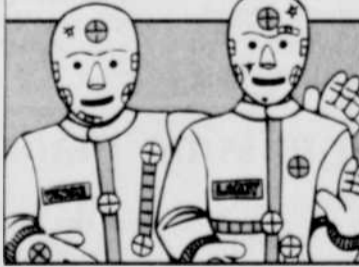
