### Program on Black airmen at Museum

"The Tuskegee Airmen and the Fight for Racial Equality During the War" is the first of six special programs sponsored by the Morrow County Museum during the exhibition of "Produce for Victory: Posters on the Homefront 1941-45", a Smithsonian exhibit at the museum from May 13 through July 12.

Darrell Millner, chairman of the Black Studies Department of Portland State University, will explore the history of the Tuskegee Airmen, a World War II training program for African-American pilots, the first such opportunity for blacks as military flyers. The success of the Tuskegee Airmen program was pivotal in influencing President Truman to desegregate the Armed Forces after the war.

Dr. Millner will present his program at the museum, Thursday, May 18, at 7 p.m. There is no charge and the public is welcome and encouraged to learn more about this little known aspect of military history, said Marsha Sweek, museum director.

This program has been made possible in part by a grant from the Oregon Council for the Humanities, an affiliate of the National Endowment for the Arts, said a news release.

### Computer glitch slows deer tag applications

A combination of computer processing problems and procrastination put a glitch in deer and elk tag purchases on deadline day, Monday, May 15.

Heppner Coast to Coast owner Cliff Green said that some hunters had a four-hour wait to process their applications on a new state com-

puterized system. Green said that problems occurred because each step on the computer required a line and once that step was finished that line would be lost. "Some redesign of the program would make a big difference," he said. This is the first time that all the tag applications were hooked up to a main frame in Portland, said Green.

Green processed around 151 people Monday, which "wasn't really a big day," he said, but "the big crunch came at 4 p.m. as people got off work." At one point he had

around 25 people in line, resulting in a four-hour wait.

Green said that hunters have been able to purchase the tags since February, but procrastinated until the last day. Eight to ten people opted not to wait in line, and some drove to Hermiston only to find a longer line there, he said.

The next day Green was informed that the deadline had been extended for one day. Green said he called the mill to notify as many people as possible about the extension.

The tags were for deer, elk, cougar, antelope and doe.

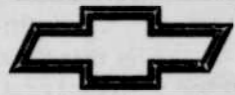

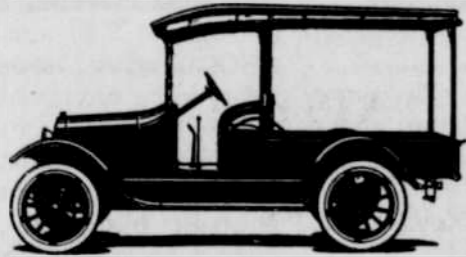

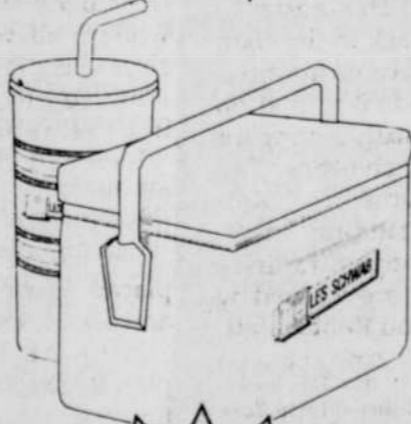
