

## Wright family reunion draws over 125

Over 125 descendants of Jephtha Wright gathered at the Hardman Community Hall on July 2, for a family reunion hosted by Orian Albert and Beverly Wright and immediate family.

Albert Wright was a son of Jephtha Wright who took the Oregon Trail in 1852, arriving in Oregon City in 1853. Albert and family then moved to Morrow County on Rhea Creek in 1872.

While the Albert Wright family has held reunions in the past, this one was different. A book published in 1994 identified over 3,000 descendants of Jephtha Wright. All the living cousins were invited. People came from Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Hawaii, Washington, Idaho and Texas.

The reunion started at Anson Wright Memorial Park but rain forced a move to Hardman.

The oldest cousin attending was Mildred Farrens Wright of Heppner and the youngest was Katelyn Wright, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jeremy Wright of Abilene, Texas. Jackson Gilliam of Ocean View, Hawaii, traveled the farthest. Also in attendance was Jeff Rehm of Fort Wayne, Indiana, who wrote

"The Jephtha Wright Story". Rehm is working on a second book which traces the cousins' ancestry back to the kings and queens of England, 420 A.D.

The Morrow County Museum will have a copy of both, said a Wright family spokesperson.

CAPTION: THREE-YEAR OPERATING SERIAL LEVY QUESTION: SHALL DISTRICT LEVY \$450,000 PER YEAR FOR THREE YEARS OUTSIDE THE TAX BASE FOR OPERATING PURPOSES BEGINNING IN 1995-1996?

EXPLANATION: This measure will provide funds to the Morrow County Unified Recreation District (M.C.U.R.D.), in order to continue several programs for Morrow County school aged students, which have been eliminated or reduced because of funding shortfalls. Various programs will be funded at the elementary, middle and high school levels including, but not limited to, art, athletics, drama club, debate, student yearbook and newspaper, musical performances including band and choir, vocational, marketing, business clubs and outdoor school. Student programs will be administered by the Morrow County School District through an agreement with the M.C.U.R.D. The levy also includes a portion for community activities. Community activities will be administered by the M.C.U.R.D. The total amount of money to be raised by the serial levy will be \$1,350,000. The tax will reduce collections of other districts. SUBSOILING FOR SITE PREPARATION AND MECHANICAL THINNING

USDA Forest Service Umatilla National Forest Heppner Ranger District Morrow County, Oregon

On July 14, Heppner District Ranger, Delanne Ferguson, made a decision to implement the 1995 Subsoiling for Site Preparation and Mechanical Thinning on the Heppner Ranger District. Subsoiling for site preparation will relieve soil compaction, while subsoiling for mechanical thinning will reduce vegetative competition and relieve soil compaction. This project will include 1,349 acres of subsoiling for site preparation, and 1,791 acres of mechanical thinning. This will be treated over a four to five year period.

The Decision Notice and associated project file are available upon request from the Heppner Ranger District, P.O. Box 7, Heppner, OR 97836.

This decision is subject to appeal pursuant to Forest Service regulations at 36 CFR 215.7. Appeals must meet the content requirements of 36 CFR 215.14.
