The Heppner Ranger District intends to implement the Tamarack and Skookum Pine Commercial Thinning Sales.

The Skookum Sale is located along Forest Road 21 near Tupper Work Station, within Morrow and Grant counties, Oregon. Approximately 200,000 board feet would be harvested as a result of thinning 235 acres of overstocked, green ponderosa pine stands. About half of these acres would be left untreated to provide big game cover and maintain visuals along Road 21.

The Tamarack Sale is located in the southwest part of the District between Highway 207 and Tamarack Spring, within Wheeler and Grant counties, Oregon. Approximately 250,000 board feet would be harvested as a result of thinning 370 acres of overstocked, green ponderosa pine stands. About half of these acres would be left untreated to provide big game cover and maintain visuals along Highway 207.

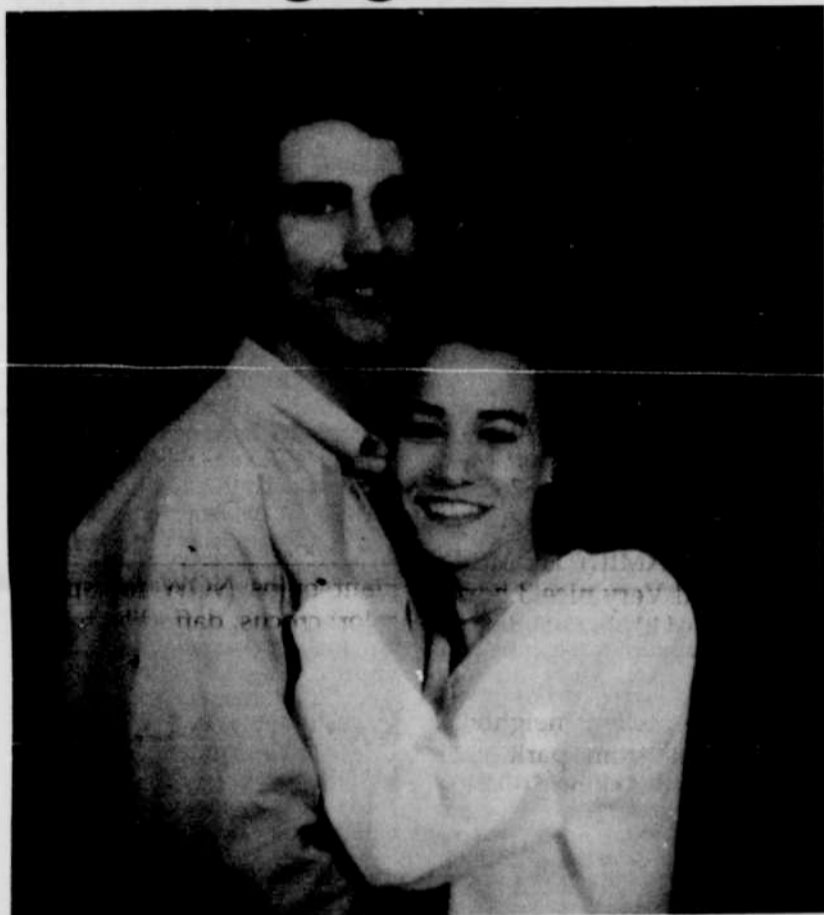
