In 1978, when son, Steve, now 17, was born, Jannie quit teaching to raise her family. The Allens stayed in Fossil another year. In 1979, Dick became school superintendent in Spray and the family moved there. Jannie worked as a substitute teacher.

In 1985, the Allens moved to Lone where Dick became school principal. Jannie started teaching sixth grade half time at Heppner Elementary. This year she moved to a full time position teaching fifth grade.

Principal at Heppner Elementary and the evening's presenter, Bill Karwacki said that Jannie "scores an A-plus in all categories" and added, "I can think of no educator that has a more positive effect on her peers."

Jannie is a member of the Lone United Church of Christ and is very active supporting the church's annual fund raising auction and the Lone Youth Group, an ecumenical youth organization. She assists and helps organize the group's annual projects, helping the homeless in Portland and shoveling snow for the elderly in Lone. Along with Jeri McElligott, Cathy Halvorsen and the Rev. Lea Mathieu, Jannie works on the Youth Group's participation in the "Human Race", which raises money for the Outreach Ministries. Last year the lone group earned more money for Outreach Ministries than any other group and were honored at a banquet in Portland.

Jannie is also chairperson for the Trail Blazer Reading Program for fifth and sixth graders, and chairs a crafts and food bazaar to raise money for the Jason Halvorsen Memorial Scholarship. Jason was an outstanding student and athlete who died in a car accident.

Jannie has been a 4-H craft club leader for the past five years and helps her daughter, Elizabeth, 14, with a project to collect coats and donations for hats and gloves for the Greenhouse Youth Shelter.

This year, Jannie, along with Karla Waterland, will co-chair the Heppner St. Patrick's Celebration craft fair.

On top of everything Jannie has become Lone's resident sign painter and enjoys doing calligraphy for both the elementary and high schools.

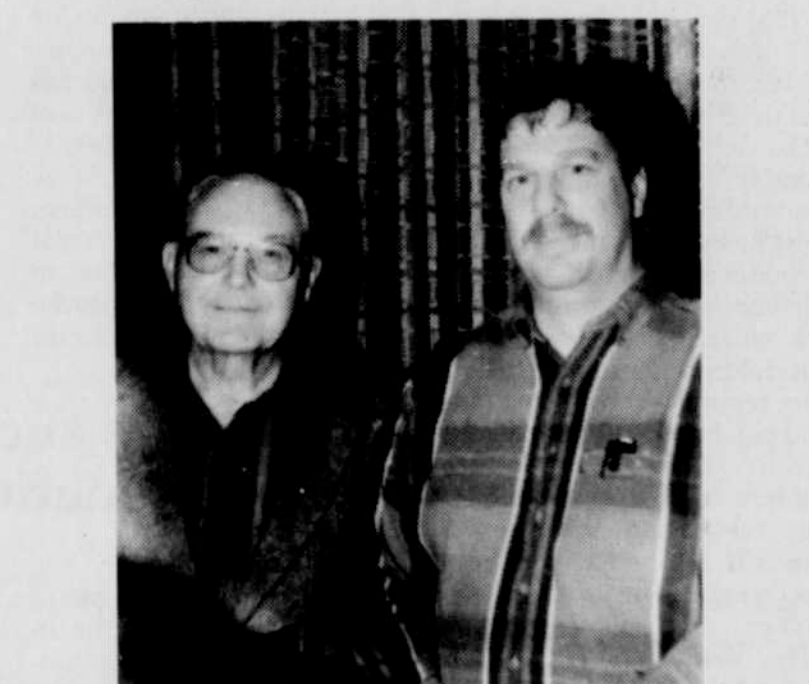
