USDA Forest Service Umatilla National Forest Heppner Ranger District Morrow, Grant, and Wheeler counties, Oregon

On July 22, 1996, Heppner District Ranger, Delanne Ferguson, decided to implement the Far Side Roadside Salvage. The purpose of this sale is to recover economic value of blown down trees and to impede further spread of the Western pine beetle. Approximately 90 Mbf of wood products will be salvaged along 320 miles of open and seasonally open forest roads. Only dead and dying trees will be salvaged.

This salvage decision is not subject to appeal, since it qualified as a salvage sale as described in the provisions of subsection 2001 (e) of Public Law 104-19. The documents and procedures required for the preparation, advertisement, offering, awarding, and operation of this salvage project shall be deemed to satisfy the requirements of the applicable environmental laws as listed in subsection 2001 (i) of Public Law 104-19. This salvage decision is subject to judicial review only in the United States district court for the district in which the affected Federal lands are located. As required under Section 2001 (f)(1) of Public Law 104-19, any challenge to this salvage project must be filed in the district court within 15 days after the advertisement of the sale.
