

Heppner Garden Club flower show and tea set Sept. 21-22

Pick your prettiest posies and feast your eyes on fall flowers at the Flower Show and Tea, sponsored by the Heppner Garden Club at the St. Patrick Senior Center, Sept. 21-22.

Entries will be received from 7-9 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 20, and from 8-10 a.m. on Saturday. The show will be open to the public from 2-7 p.m. on Saturday, and from 1-5 p.m. Sunday.

All amateur gardeners are invited to exhibit. More than one entry per class may be made by an exhibitor, provided each entry is of a different cultivar, type, or color. All blooming flowers will be accepted and entered according to many classifications. Containers for cut specimens will be provided.

Exhibitors may also enter several categories for flower collections. These must include five stems of any annual or perennial. There can also be a collection of five different varieties of the same flower. One class will feature a collection of flowers of any and all types that are the same color.

Arrangements will be featured in several different categories according to design. Creative designs can also be entered in classes entitled "harvest" (using fruit, vegetables, flowers) and in "basket beautiful" as well as "arranger's choice" or one class featuring all dried natural plant materials.

Participants 15 and under are encouraged to enter in the youth division. One class in this division features animals or people made from vegetables and/or flowers. Also included is a class for any plant grown by any exhibitor this year. Or participants in the youth division may enter any flower arrangement of the exhibitor's choice.

General rules: All amateurs are invited to exhibit. 1) Entries will be received from 7-9 p.m. Friday and 8-10 a.m. Saturday. 2) Judging will begin promptly at 11 a.m.

Only required personnel will be in the show room during judging. 3) Exhibits must be removed by 6 p.m. Sunday.

Division One-horticulture: horticulture rules-1) specimens and collections must have been grown by the exhibitor. 2) More than one entry per class may be made by the exhibitor provided each is of a different cultivar, type or color. 3) All specimens should be labeled (and with botanical names when possible). 4) The committee may subdivide classes by type and color. 5) Containers for cut specimens will be provided. Classes: 1. asters, one stem; 2. black-eyed susan, one spray; 3. canna, one stem; 4. chrysanthemum, one stem; 5. cosmos, three stems; 6. dahlias, 8" or over, one bloom; 7. dahlias, 4-8", one bloom; 8. dahlias, under 4", one bloom; 9. daisy, one stem; 10. michaelmas daisy, one spray; 11. gloriosa daisy, one stem; 12. geranium, one stem; 13. marigold, small; 14. marigold, large, one stem; 15. nasturtiums, three stems; 16. petunias, single, one spray; 17. petunias, double, one spray; 18. cone flower, one stem; 19. rose, hybrid tea, one bloom; 20. rose, floribunda, one spray; 21. snapdragon, one spike; 22. sweet pea, three stems; 23. zinnia, large, one bloom; 24. zinnia, small, three stems; 25. any annual not listed above, one stem or spray; 26. any perennial not listed above, one stem or spray.

The following National Council ribbons may be awarded if merited: Sweepstakes in both horticulture and design divisions (rosette of green and white); Appreciation (rosette of orchid); Petite (rosette of blue and white); Distinction (rosette of brown and gold); Award of Merit for fresh plant material (rosette of orange); Collector's Showcase (rosette of brown and green); Creativity (rosette of purple); Educational (rosette of brown and white); and Junior Achievement in the youth division.

Stockgrowers plan barbecue

Ribs, steaks, corn-on-the-cob, salads, and toe-tapping music are all part of a benefit barbecue planned for Saturday, Sept. 14 in Fossil. Proceeds from the barbecue, sponsored in part by the Wheeler County Stockgrowers Association, will benefit the opposition campaign to Measure 38, the "Clean Stream Initiative."

Opponents of Measure 38 have raised over \$230,000 of a goal \$550,000 for an advertising campaign. Wheeler County residents have contributed \$3,300 to the campaign thus far.

The barbecue will begin at 4 p.m. in the Isobel Edwards Hall in Fossil, immediately following the Wheeler County Ranch Rodeo. Cost is \$12 for adults and \$8 for children, and is tax-deductible. Music will be provided by the Wheeler County Trio Old-Time Fiddlers.
