

### Energy assistance available

The Low Income Energy Assistance Program operated by CAPECO has received additional funds to assist eligible households with their winter heating bills. The program is designed to provide a one-time payment to help pay for the increase of energy used during the cold months for heat. Pay-

ments are issued to an energy vendor who then applies it as a credit to the household's account.

To be eligible for assistance, a household of one can have monthly income up to \$806 and this amount increases \$273 for each additional household member.

Students who attended the showcase visited the businesses' booths and attended career exploration classes and employability skills training through the Morrow-Umatilla Workforce Quality Committee.

Students were able to attend one of four career exploration classes-"Career Goals and Objectives", "Occupations for the Year 2000", "Technology in the Workforce", and "Virtual Reality in the Workforce". They were also required to fill out questionnaires about the businesses.

Following the presentations, students toured the "East Oregonian" newspaper office and the Pendleton Woolen Mills.

The eighth graders were to dress as if they were going to a job interview and maintaining a good attitude is also stressed.

"I felt like it was a great day," said local organizer and teacher Greg Grant, who accompanied the students on the trip. "The kids came home excited. The idea was to get students thinking seriously about decisions they will make in their schooling."

### Lone Site Council holds meeting

The lone Site Council met February 12 at lone High School. Greg Grant, supervisor of the School to Careers Program for lone and Heppner, spoke to the council about his role at the schools. He described some of the activities the students are engaged in and some of the projects he is exploring for the future. He encouraged the site council to look into the feasibility of lone students participating in the student exchange with Centennial School in Portland.

The council discussed the resources available to help Hispanic students adjust to attending lone Schools. The faculty has expressed frustration at not being able to communicate with the students to access their needs, and the inability to determine what level of work they are capable of doing. Currently only the students who may have learning difficulties are tested. Because of the language barrier, it is difficult for teachers to know when students need special resources, they said. been resources for the lone staff. The teachers and ESL educational assistant Shelly Key say that they believe progress is being made. Key recommended the classrooms be equipped with pocket translators, flash cards, workbooks and library books written in Spanish. Principal Dick Allen suggested asking Karen Holland to come to the school to help teachers conference with their Hispanic students.

Allen reported that overall the staff is pleased with the social behavior of lone students. Their main concern was the students' lack of tolerance toward each other. The council decided not to make a school improvement goal based on the tolerance issue, but to allow the school staff to work with students to see if improvements can be made.
