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What's black and red and climbs walls?

What's black and red and climbs walls? Anyone who has lived in the Columbia Basin for very long probably knows the answer to this riddle, especially if they live in a two story yellow house near large maple trees.

During the cold winter months, these dime-sized grayish black bugs with conspicuous red lines on their back and margins, can be found congregating in alarmingly high numbers on the walls of many homes.

The western boxelder bug, or more correctly, the western maple bug (*Leptocoris trivittatus*), spend their summers as bright red bugs feeding on maple trees, growing larger and becoming blacker with each molt (or body change). As the weather begins to cool in the fall, the boxelder bugs undergo their final molt into the adult form, with fully developed wings. As the leaves begin to turn gold, the boxelder bugs leave their summer home and seek out warm dry places to spend the cold winter months. Light colored, sunny, south-facing walls with rough textures are favored, though root cellars, attics, and crawl spaces will also do. In spring, they leave their winter sites, fly to maple trees, lay eggs and die.

Despite their name, Dr. Jack DeAngelis, OSU Extension Entomology Specialist, informs us that the western boxelder bug young can only survive on maple leaves, and that "true" boxelder bugs only occur in the east.

Boxelder bugs cause no damage whatsoever. They will not harm your home, they can't bite and don't carry diseases. They are not even a serious pest to maple trees. They can be a nuisance, especially if you are one of those folks that abhor bugs. They gain entry to homes through cracks or open doors, and like Uncle Joe, will remain all winter if allowed to stay. Though not destructive, their droppings (or smashed bodies) can spot interior furnishings.

First of all, decide if you really need to control this insect. They may be a bit of a pest, but do no real harm. Non-chemical means of control include caulking openings and cracks around doors and windows, as well as any holes to your crawl space or attic, like those put in for phone, power, or TV cables. Insects on outside walls or root cellars can be swept or vacuumed off, and

discarded into a bucket of soapy water to drown. Such actions won't completely eliminate boxelder bugs but will reduce their numbers. Adult boxelder bugs can fly long distances so removal, or summertime spraying, of nearby maple trees is no guarantee of control, though it can help. It may also be useful to remove large firs or cedars immediately around your house which shelter the overwintering adults.
 Application of encapsulated forms of insecticides like diazinon (Knox Out PT 1500), chlorpyrifos (Empire 20) or cyfluthrin (Optem PT 600) around outside doors, windows, and walls can help prevent entry of this pest into your home. Of these chemicals, encapsulated diazinon is the easiest to get, but least effective and leaves a slight odor, and Optem PT 600 is generally only available to pest control companies. Be sure you get the encapsulated form of these chemicals, other forms break down in sunlight and won't give long lasting control. It is not recommended that any of these be used inside your home. In his publication "Urban Entomology Reference Notebook", Dr. DeAngelis also cautions that none of these insecticides work well after the weather turns cold, or in the spring.
 As the weather begins to warm up this spring, you may notice large numbers of these harmless bugs crawling around, in, or on, your house. Don't be alarmed. They're just coming out of their winter hiding places and will soon disperse to a maple tree to launch a new brood you can welcome to your home next fall.
