Workshop slated

Heppner Elementary School teacher Barb Orwick will once again hold Academic Skills Workshops (ASW) in the evenings for students and their parents.

The workshop is designed to help students achieve at their full potential, said Orwick. Parents attend the workshop with their child and learn how they can set up a successful program at home, she said.

Mustangs shut down Prospectors, 20-0 Sourdough workshop to be held

The Heppner Mustangs got back on the right track by beating the Grant Union Prospectors 20-0 last Friday night in Heppner.

The Mustangs ability to run the ball and Grant Union mistakes were the keys to the win.

After receiving the opening kick-off, the Mustangs picked up two first downs before the Prospectors held. Sophomore Levi Geer ran five yards for the first first down, and Junior Shane Matheny ran a quarterback sneak five yards for the second. Grant Union then got a roughing the punter penalty to give Heppner a first down at their 48 yard line.

Grant Union's defense stiffened again and blocked Tyson Palmeteer's punt and returned it to the Mustangs 20 yard line. The Prospectors moved the ball to the eight yard line before fumbling the ball. Sophomore Jake Roy recovered for Heppner.

After a Heppner punt, the Prospectors again fumbled with Geer jumping on the loose ball.

With the Mustangs taking over at their own 41, Matheny completed a pass to Junior Derek Gunderson for a first down. The first quarter ended with both teams failing to get on the scoreboard.

Matheny kept the ball on the option for a 24-yard gain and first down, then ran a bootleg four yards down to the 12 yard line for another first down. Gunderson then ran around right end for a touchdown and a 6-0 Heppner lead. Next Matheny hit Gunderson on a pass for the two point conversion and Heppner led 8-0 with 8:36 left in the second quarter.

After the ensuing kick-off went out of bounds the Prospectors took over at their 35 yard line. They got one of their few first downs on a quarterback sneak by Josh Woods out to midfield. A long pass was held up by the stiff, cool breeze and Gunderson intercepted and returned to the Prospectors 32 yard line.

Geer had a seven yard run and Senior Travis Wilhelm picked up a first down with a three yard run. Matheny ran a fourth down quarterback sneak down to the nine yard line. On a third and goal from the six, Matheny carried down to the four-inch line. Matheny then sneaked it in on fourth down for a touchdown and a 14-0 Heppner lead. The two point conversion attempt failed and with 2:04 left in the first half the Mustangs had a two touchdown lead.

The Prospectors then returned the kick-off 40 yards to the Mustang 46 yard line. A pass interference penalty on Heppner moved the ball down to the 22 yard line. After Junior Tim Dickenson knocked down a pass, Grant Union completed a pass to the nine. Junior Casey Evans then chased the quarterback nearly sacking him, but causing an

illegal receiver penalty as the pass bounced off an offensive lineman.

Matheny then knocked down a pass and Geer stopped a run for no gain and the half ended with Heppner still ahead 14-0.

After intermission both teams defenses dominated the third quarter.

After trading punts Grant Union had the ball on their 35 yard line. Junior Royal Robinson rushed in and sacked the Prospectors' quarterback Woods for a six yard loss. However, a controversial unsportsmanlike penalty on Heppner moved the ball out to the 44. On fourth down Evans tackled Woods for a three yard loss and the Mustangs took over at the 41.

The Mustangs moved the ball down to the 24, but on fourth down the Prospectors intercepted a pass at the three yard line and returned it out to the 32. The third quarter ended with Heppner still in front 14-0.

After Grant Union picked up two first downs Wilhelm recovered a fumble at the Prospectors 46 yard line.

The Mustangs couldn't move the ball and Grant Union took over at their 40 yard line. The Prospectors then moved backwards with an offensive pass interference penalty and a Tim Sumner sack. The Prospectors then got a booming 58 yard punt that Gunderson misplayed but recovered to return the ball 10 yards.

Grant Union was then flagged for a 15 yard unsportsmanlike penalty. Before the Mustangs could snap the ball the same player received another penalty and was ejected. So instead of being deep in their own territory they had the ball at the 46 yard line.

The Mustangs offensive line then took over as they ran through the Prospectors for big gains. Gunderson and Matheny took turns before Matheny ran the final seven yards for a touchdown with 3:14 remaining in the ballgame. Freshman Blake Knowles' kick was wide right and the Mustangs enjoyed a 20-0 lead.

The Prospectors failed to get a first down and Coach Greg Grant let the second team run out the final 2:08.

"We grew up a lot from last week. I was very encouraged tonight," Grant said. "We had better tackling, better blocking, and we were in better shape than last week."

"We still need to work on understanding the offense, but we are getting better," he added.

Heppner ran the ball better, rushing 47 times for 174 yards. Shane Matheny led the Mustangs with 11 carries for 54 yards. Derek Gunderson was right behind him with 14 rushes for 53 yards. Sophomore Michael Schonbachler rushed 10 times for 26 yards. Travis Wilhelm ran nine times for 25 yards.

Matheny only attempted four passes, completing one to

Gunderson for eight yards. He had one interception.

The Mustangs defense played real well only allowing Grant Union 55 yards rushing and 34 yards passing. The point totals on defense were spread evenly with Royal Robinson leading the way with 14 points. Matheny, Wilhelm and Tim Sumner each had 11 points. Casey Evans and Clint Bellamy each had nine, and Gunderson and Jake Roy had eight.

The Mustangs take next Friday off and get ready to face the Weston-McEwen Tigerscots in Athena on September 19 at 7:30 p.m. This will be a crucial game for both teams in the race for the Columbia Basin Conference Championship.

The Mustang Junior Varsity plays at home on Monday the 8th against Weston McEwen and Monday the 15th against Wahtonka. The Weston McEwen game starts at 5p.m. and the Wahtonka game starts at 6p.m.

Since pioneer days, sourdough has been a Western staple. The tangy flavor has delighted generations in breads, pancakes, and other baked goods.

The Morrow and Umatilla Family community Education (FCE) program will offer a free sourdough cookery workshop to members and the general public, Wednesday, September 24, at the Athena Catholic Church Hall. The workshop will begin promptly at 10 a.m.

According to Carol Michael, Morrow/Umatilla Extension Agent, FCE members in the Columbia Basin studied sourdough cookery in the late 1960s. The techniques and recipes shared at the early workshop have been used, adapted, revised, and well traveled in the past 30 years. In the course of travel, some of the recipes have lost their connection to the name of the originator.

Long term Umatilla County Extension study group members Jenny Zerba, Jeanne Megy and Doreen Munck compared their original recipes with younger versions found in Oregon Wheat Commission materials, and Extension study group lesson materials from various Oregon counties. "No matter how widely the recipes had traveled, the fact is they consistently produce a successful product," says Michael. Six of the recipes will be shared and demonstrated at the workshop. About 20 additional "Heritage Sourdough Recipes" will be available for a small charge to cover the cost of reproduction.

Tips on establishing and caring for sourdough starters will be covered by FCE leaders. Samples of starter will be shared with those who bring a clean glass container. "And of course, we will conclude the workshop with samples of sourdough baked goods," says Munck.

"We are anxious to share the adventure of sourdough cookery with coming generations," says Jenny Zerba. "We also want to remind our veteran members that sharing heritage recipes can be a good way to pass on traditions within our own families," Zerba continues.

The Family Community Education Program is a volunteer organization affiliated with Oregon State University Extension Service. Programs such as the Heritage Sourdough Workshop train community leaders to reach the lesson within their own organizations. The main topic of discussion will be the approval of the Child


Care Development Block Grant proposals.
