**Ione ends week with first loss**

The Ione Lady Cardinals' teams were intent on making the Dufur Rangers Oct. 4 homecoming festivities a little less festive. Even after a bus breakdown and late arrival by the invading teams, it looked like Ione was handing Dufur a surprising challenge and all they could handle on the volleyball court. Browns were furred intently and already shiny with perspiration when the teams faced off, with Ione taking the serve.

Kara Miller led off scoring for the raucous Cardinals and got them out in the lead by two. Followed by a scoreless Ranger side out, Katie Tworek increased Ione's lead to 5-0 and the homecoming crowd started showing a little more respect for the visitors. Dufur wasn't going to let up their intensity and Camie Burright's jump serve was volleyed back and forth for several minutes with amazing saves and back row digs on both sides before Burright got the last tip over and put the ball to the floor unanswered for her only score in that rotation.

The Rangers scored two before being blocked at the net by a combined effort from Nikki McElligott and Jenny Sullivan. Nikki Sullivan scored two and Ione was in the lead by six, 8-2. J. Sullivan had another block at the net to stop Dufur at three points, but the Cards couldn't score in two rotations and the Rangers slowly crept closer.

J. Sullivan put Ione ahead by three, 9-6, but the Cardinals couldn't stop the Rangers' relentless attack. Even with good serving, Ione couldn't pick up a point through three rotations and finally succumbed the match, 10-15.  
In the second game, Dufur had the lead by four before Ione got the side out and put Tworek up to serve. She got the Cards on the board with three, followed by two scoreless side outs for both teams. The Rangers tweaked one in on a break and Burright came right back with a point for Ione, and the score was 4-5.  
A scoreless side out for Dufur

put N. Sullivan at serve for the Cardinals and she tied the game, 5-5. Another scoreless side out for Dufur brought Miller up to serve and, assisted with a block at the net by J. Sullivan and Brenda Burright, Ione was in the lead by one. Again, the Rangers turned the ball back to the Cards without scoring and McElligott landed one to increase Ione's lead to 7-5.

Dufur surged back with a vengeance and scored five before being stopped at the net. B. Burright scored Ione's final point before the Rangers took over and finished the game and the Lady Cardinals' winning streak with the final score, Ione, 8, Dufur, 15.

It was one of the toughest matches of this season and the Cardinals played their hardest since facing Wallowa early in the year. "We know Dufur found our weaknesses and were able to capitalize on them while we didn't take advantage of Ranger errors," said a Cardinal team member. "But on the whole, we were pleased with our game effort and certainly showed improvement over our earlier meeting with the Rangers in the Wahtonka Tournament."

Ione was on the road through Tuesday night, Oct. 7, at Condon. On Thursday, Oct. 9, they host Echo in Ione at 5 p.m. Ione travels to Fossil Tuesday, Oct. 14; Condon comes to Ione, Friday, Oct. 17; Arlington is at Ione, Thursday, Oct. 23; and the final game of the regular season is in Culver, Saturday, Oct. 25 at 5 p.m.
